SURVEY AIMS AT HILLSBORO.

Engineer R. R. MacLeod, who with a crew of 12 men, has been making surveys for the new route of the Southern Pacific Railway Company between Hillsboro and Oregon City, has finished this part of the work, and about the first of the month will transfer his crew to the Tualatin river. The line was run from the Willamette river at Oswego, to the Tualatin river, and the next survey will be in the direction of Hillsboro, but whether it will terminate at Hillsboro depends on the disposition of the people there. It may intersect the present West Side line between Reedville and Hillsboro. Mr. MacLeod and his men have made their headquarters at Milwaukie in the Pioneer Hotel building for the last six months.

Engineer MacLeod said Thursday that the route now practically settled begins at Hillsboro, just south of the Portland Woolen Mills plant, where the heavy grade on the present line of the road starts, and extends through Richard Scott's farm, west of the present location of the powder houses. The new survey was made directly through Milwaukie, east of the school house, crossing Mill creek and the track of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company at an elevation of 16 feet above the track, striking the northwest corner of Milwaukie Heights, nearly opposite Elk Rock island. It then follows around the bend of the river along the edge of Oak Grove, and through Risley's hop field to a point opposite Oswego, where the branch connecting the West Side division will cross the Willamette river on a steel bridge. The route then re-crosses the track of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company and passes through one side of the Jennings addition, and crosses the Clackamas river between the bridge of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company and the S. P. iron bridge. From the Clackamas river the survey is independent of the present line through Oregon City.

"This survey," said Mr. MacLeod, "shortens the distance between Hillsboro and Oregon City materially, but the gain is in avoiding the heavy grade now encountered on the present line. The entire grade of the new survey is very moderate through to Oregon City, and it will be the main line. We have encountered no material difficulty in the survey on the new East Side line. At Milwaukie the Mayor and Councilmen have indicated their willingness to grant a franchise, and the people have treated us nicely."

"I expect to transfer my headquarters to the Tualatin river about the first of the month. The Tualatin district is a very beautiful and rich country, and only needs a railway to develop its resources. The soil is of great fertility. Whether the connecting link between the East Side and the West Side divisions terminates at Hillsboro depends on the people of that place. It may be necessary to make the connection between Reedville and Hillsboro."

Mr. MacLeod said that a very good location for the steel bridge at Oswego had been secured. The span required will be between 600 and 700 feet long, and high enough to allow the passage of steamers.

HEROES OF THE KLEEMAN DROWNING.

A young man who played in the Verboort Kermis musicale at Forest Grove July 5, Mr. Kleeman the violinist, was drowned last week at Newport while swimming in the surf. Ex-senator S. B. Huston, of Hillsboro, was one of the foremost in attempting to save him, but modestly makes

no mention of it in his communication to the Oregonian telling of the rescue. Mr. Huston says of the other Washington county participants:

"Another man who risked his life in the attempt to save the young man was A. B. Thomas, a merchant of Forest Grove. This man, although old enough to have risked his life for his country in the 60's and to be entitled to wear a G. A. R. button, plunged bodily into the surf and made a desperate effort to prevent the tragedy which occurred."

"When the alarm was given, my son, Carl Huston, aged 13, had the presence of mind to run for a rope, which he procured but which was unfortunately not long enough to reach the drowning man. Had the rope been 30 or 40 feet longer, the result would have undoubtedly been different. If young men would only learn that the surf is no place to swim; no difference how good a swimmer one is, there is always danger when one goes beyond his depth, then such tragedies would never occur."

CIRCUIT COURT.

Wm. A. Spence on August 27, 1903, brought an action against B. F. Purdy, president, and E. H. Jeter, secretary of the Gaston Co-operative Milling Co., a corporation, defendants, and in his complaint alleges in substance, among other things, that he was induced by said Purdy and Jeter to buy 414 shares of the capital stock of said corporation at the apparent face value of \$10 per share, aggregating in all the sum of \$4140.00, and that he transferred certain tracts of land to defendants in payment for said stock. And he alleges a conspiracy on the part of defendants in that they misrepresented the financial standing of the corporation; that on the strength of said representations he was induced to buy said stock, and that thereafter plaintiff discovered that the corporation was wholly insolvent. Plaintiff prays for judgment against the defendants for the sum of \$4140.00, interest and costs. Geo. R. Bagley and Wm. D. Hare appears as attorneys for plaintiff.

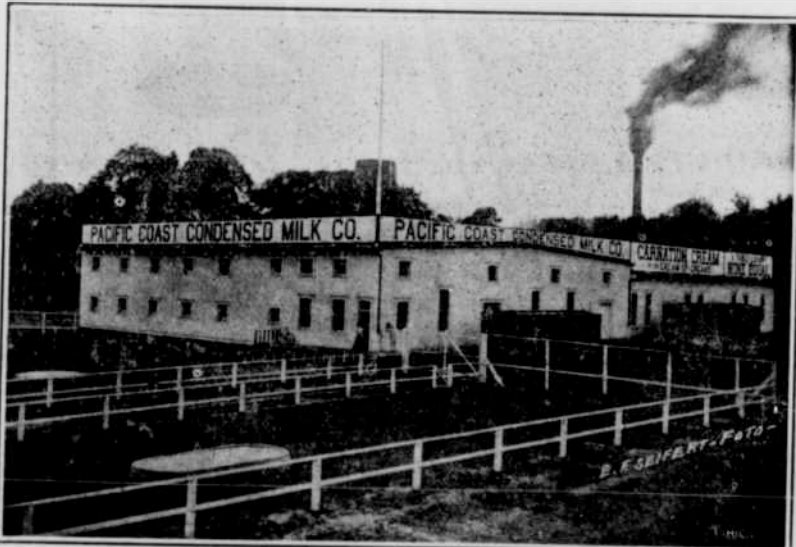

MONEY, in the sense that we use it now, is a conventional sign that gives the right, or, rather, the possibility, to profit by the work of some one else. IN ITS IDEAL SENSE MONEY SHOULD NOT GIVE THIS RIGHT OR POSSIBILITY IF IT DID NOT ACTUALLY REPRESENT LABOR DONE, and it could be used in this way in a society that condemned violence in any form, but as soon as there is any room for violence—that is, for the possibility of profiting by the work of another without doing any work yourself—money readily lends itself for this purpose.

MAN IN MODERN SOCIETY SELLS THE PRODUCTS OF HIS PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE WORK FOR MONEY, not because money to him is a convenient form of exchange, but because others DEMAND MONEY from him as A SIGN OF WORK that he is forced to perform.
