Confronted with two ugly looking six-shooters, J. H. Burke, a man about 30 years of age, and claiming Portland as his home, was forced to submit to arrest while attempting to cash a forged paper at E. W. Haines' bank Thursday morning. The six-shooters were manipulated by President Haines and Cashier Kane, who were expecting a call from Burke.

Burke called at the bank Wednesday afternoon with a paper bearing the forged signature of Walter Bernards, a well-to-do farmer, who lives about two miles north of Forest Grove. He asked to have it cashed, but the cashier suspecting the genuineness of the paper, requested Burke to return the next morning, as he wished to look up the account of Mr. Bernards. In the evening Mayor Kane drove to Mr. Bernards' place and inquired about the paper. It was a case of forgery. Mr. Bernards declared, and he explained that a man answering Burke's description had called at the farm and represented himself as traveling salesman of a firm dealing in farming machinery. He had asked Mr. Bernards to place his signature in a memorandum-book so that upon his return to his farm he could mail him some catalogues.

Cashier Kane also remembered that Burke had called at the bank earlier in the day to ascertain if Mr. Bernards' paper would be good. These circumstances caused the cashier to be on the lookout for his man, and he armed himself with a revolver.

Burke appeared at the bank in the morning soon after the doors had opened. Instead of getting the \$300, however, he faced the gun as he reached out for the gold, and was ordered to throw up his hands. Meanwhile the bank president had taken a position at the entrance, and with drawn revolver prevented Burke from making good his escape. The sight of the two deadly weapons had the desired effect, for Burke threw up his hands and kept them above his head till the arrival of Marshal Cronin, and in a few minutes Burke was safely locked up in the bastille.

In the afternoon he was removed to the County Jail at Hillsboro by Deputy Sheriff E. B. Sappington, where he will be given a preliminary examination.

When searched Burke had \$380 in gold, \$85 in currency and a 17-jewel gold watch on his person. He came to this place on a 1903 model Rambler bicycle, numbered 10712, of the 63 model.

Burke declined to make any statement, acting on the advice of his attorney.
