Grain, Flour, Feed, Etc.

The wheat market is in poor shape. Eastern markets continue to decline, and foreign markets show no improvement. Local dealers have reduced their bids another cent, and the drop has well nigh checked business, as the farmers are not disposed to sell.

THE LATE JOHN N. FISHER.

(The death of ex-Mayor J. N. Fisher of Beaverton was reported in last issue, but coming by telephone no extended notice was possible. The funeral services were held last Sunday morning, and are reported in the Beaverton correspondence.—Ed.)

The late John N. Fisher, of Beaverton, Oregon, was born in Troy township, Ashland county, Ohio, February 6, 1842, and died September 18, 1903, being 61 years, 7 months, 12 days old. When a boy of seven years his parents died, leaving him amongst strangers.

All the schooling he received was 11 months in a country school. He did chores, chopped wood, until the beginning of the Civil War, when at the age of 19 years he joined the Union army September 10, 1861, as private in Company C of 42nd Ohio Volunteers, and served three years, receiving an honorable discharge. He was in many battles, notably Vicksburg, under Grant. During this time he was promoted for gallantry.

After the war he became interested in newspaper work, and became editor of the Omaha Bee.

Coming to Oregon in 1876 Mr. Fisher located in Beaverton, Washington county, where he had since resided.

With George Steel he took a contract getting out ties for the railroad company and became engaged in dairying, onion growing, farming and the butcher business.

During his stay in Beaverton he had held many offices.

He took a great interest in debating, educational enterprises and politics, was a straight Republican, and always worked for the best interests of the party in his precinct.

Joining as a charter member F. J. Babcock Post No. 30, G. A. R., he held the office of Commander. He became a Master Mason when 21 years old, and joined Beaverton lodge No. 100, A. F. & A. M., as a charter member, and had held the office of Worshipful Master.

In 1878 Mr. Fisher was united in marriage to Miss Della C. Allen. Of this union seven children were born—Earl, Mrs. W. H. Cady, May, Lloyd, Elsie, Dora and Esther, and one grandchild, Elta Cady, who will mourn his loss.

In younger years he took a great interest in religious work, and always had a firm belief in a hereafter, and said he would go first to be there and greet his family as they "came home" by-and-by.

DEATH OF MISS A. M. BERGERSON AT ALBION.

Miss Anna Mary Bergerson, who died Sept. 13, was a sister of Adolf, Peter and Charles Bergerson; born in Norway July 4, 1869, and came to this country with her parents in 1872. They settled in Minnesota, and from there she came to Oregon with her mother in 1895, settling three miles northwest of Aloia on the Nehalem. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Heverling, of Vernonia. The remains were interred in the Clear Creek cemetery. Her aged mother has the sympathy of the entire community.
