FOREST GROVE COUNCIL MEETING

The City Council met in regular session Tuesday evening with all members present. The first issue taken up was the cow question and by resolution it was decided to submit the question to a vote of the people at the coming election. It was also decided for the coming election to use the Australian Ballot system and booths for voting.

An ordinance vacating that portion of North 5th Ave., east of North 2nd street, was presented and passed. Mr. Wagner is laying out lots and the portion of street vacated is only a half street or alley so it was thought best to allow Mr. Wagner to incorporate into the lots being laid out the said vacated street on condition that he dedicate to the public a full street a few feet north of the present street.

The telephone franchise question was again taken up and discussed and the report of the ordinance committee being unsatisfactory to Mr. Thatcher, of the Pacific States Telephone Company, the franchise was referred back to the committee for revision and it will be taken up again at a meeting to be held Dec. 14th to which time adjournment was taken.

THE WARNING OF HISTORY TO THE CENSORS OF THE PRESS

A press censorship has been established at Cripple Creek by the military authorities who have proclaimed martial law. The provost marshal has taken possession of the mayor's office and threatened to cut off the district from the outside world by locking up the correspondents of the Denver papers and to censor all matter to be sent to the Denver newspapers. It is announced that no publication reflecting on the government of the United States or state of Colorado will be tolerated. Such is a press report under date of December 6, 1903.

History tells how Charles X. of France signed an ordinance by which the liberty of the periodical press was suspended and there followed the three terrible days of July, the revolution against the family of Bourbon, and the uncrowning of Charles X.

In 1695 when the English press became seditious John Milton advocated its freedom, saying: "Though all the winds of doctrine were let loose to play upon the earth, so truth be in the field, we do injuriously, by licensing and prohibiting, to misdoubt her strength. Let her and falsehood grapple, who ever knew truth put to the worse in a free and open encounter?" In 1803 Napoleon, having been greatly irritated by the articles published in England, asked that the government suppress the newspapers which published articles unfriendly to himself. He was informed that the press was free and beyond the power of the government to suppress.

Frederick the Great was accounted remarkable even among statesmen accustomed to the license of a free press for the steadfastness of mind with which he upheld its freedom when he himself was the subject of one of the most stinging lampoons ever written in the world.

So a free press has ever been accounted the bulwark of popular liberty. The precedent established at New York in 1734 when John Zenger was upheld in telling the truth has been proudly cited in American courts as one of the most firmly established of our unwritten laws, and the national and state constitutions have carefully provided that no law abridging the freedom of the press shall be passed.

Is comment needed upon the despotism establishing itself at Cripple Creek? Has the censorship any place in a free country? The merits of the labor question now agitating the Colorado mining district are no longer at issue. The right of every man to labor if he will as one of the blessings of liberty is subordinate to the welfare of that safeguard of all liberty, the freedom of the press, which has never been a terror except to evildoers, which need be feared only by corrupt government.
