THE KENNEDY CASE

The Kennedy case has resulted in acquittal, the jury standing 9 to 3 in his favor on the first ballot at 9 o'clock Saturday evening, and at 4:30 Sunday morning they agreed on a verdict of not guilty. Daily newspapers argued the case in their reports until the public had quite a different basis upon which to form its opinion to the evidence considered by the jury, but it is a well founded assertion that the majority of the jurors, while entertaining that same high regard for Miss Warren in which she is deservedly held in this community, felt that anyone might honestly be mistaken and the failure of Mr. Warren to recognize a man with whom he was as well acquainted and had as much opportunity for identification as did his daughter weakened materially the state's case while the alibi was as good as could be expected of an innocent man.
 Mr. Kennedy's witnesses, either by positive testimony or corroboratory evidence to show that the circumstances could have occurred at no other time, as in the case of Witness Harrington, substantiated every material point in his account of his whereabouts on the night of the burglary and the morning following it. Exemplary good character from boyhood up was shown by the best testimony from every community where the defendant had lived, while the prosecution's sole witness to show the least cloud on his record, one Landis, a Eugene bartender, was proven to have perjured himself.
 Deputy Prosecuting Attorney E. B. Tongue for his part in the final argument before the jury has been the subject of many flattering remarks while District Attorney Allen and Judge Hewitt made able arguments and Ex-Senator Huston's plea for his client would have been hard to surpass. The trial, which cost the county about \$800, has attracted general attention, and the courtroom was daily crowded with a class seldom attending such proceedings.
