The Democratic State Convention held at Portland yesterday was a lively affair compared with the smooth manner in which the Republican State Convention passed off. Hearst boomers tried to stamped the convention and raised a dust which darkened their ambitions and nearly smothered them. The excitement was intense for over an hour and until the vote on the Hearst resolution was taken, a man could find trouble anywhere. The vote stood 151 to 115 against instructing, so that the eight delegates to St. Louis will go uninstructed. It remains a fact however, that Hearst is strong in Oregon and no compeditor to be ignored. Poor management was ascribed as the cause of the Hearst setb tck, in assailing the state organization and other local leaders. The organization effected, placed R. M. Veatch of Lane, in the chair, R. B. Montague of Linn, as secretary and C. L. Reams of Jackson, as assistant secetary.
