Notice

Attention is called to the following Section taken from Ordinance No. 105 of the City of Forest Grove.

"Section 4.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a bicycle or tricycle upon any of the sidewalks or crossings in the city of Forest Grove, Oregon, after 9 o'clock p. m., and before 5 o'clock a. m., during the months of May, June, July, August and September, and after the hour of 7 o'clock p. m. and before the hour of 6 a. m. during the months of October, November, December, January, February, March and April."

Under the city ordinances no person can ride by another person faster than at the rate of a walk and must

ring a bell when 40 feet distance from the pedestrian.

No riding at all is allowed on Pacific avenue from Martin's feed store to B street and from B street to Main street; on Main from the Third avenue to North 2nd street; on College way from Main to North 1st street; on North 1st street from the campus to A street.

If persons will observe the provisions of this ordinance they will save themselves and the city authorities from further annoyance.

dress was divided into three parts viz: "Reforms, Laws, and Testimonies. In conclusion he touched upon the local option issue as necessary to educate the people for total prohibition of man's worst enemy.
