A council of the Modern National Reserve will be organized in Forest Grove the last of this week or the first of next or just as soon as supplies ar-

rive. There will be a charter roll of 35 or 40 members, nearly all beneficiary. This order comes into the insurance arena after fraternal societies have been experimenting for years.
