No one having been in attendance at the regular evening for council meeting, a call was given in accordance with which the Common Council met Friday evening. The street committee reported good progress in repairing roads.

The Treasurer's monthly report as accepted contained balance on hand: \$204.43; receipts, \$1952.69, disbursements, \$1071.46.

Some discussion as to where the public watering trough should be placed. Finally it was left to the committee to place it where it would be out of the way, yet to be placed as convenient as possible. The committee on water rates made only a partial report. A resolution was adopted regulating the hours of sprinkling to four hours a day, from 6 to 8 in the morning and from 6 to 8 in the evening.

Mr. Cronin's salary was raised to \$15 per month, and even that does not adequately pay him for his labors.

Mr. A. B. Thomas was allowed to put a corrugated iron building on Pacific avenue in the rear of his store.

A warrant for \$1000 was ordered drawn to take up that amount of the bonded indebtedness.

The Recorder was instructed to buy the State Code and Session Laws for the use of the city.

The culvert across Third street which was tiled by Mr. Kreider, was

allowed to be closed. Several water applicants were given permission to tap the city system. Adjourned.
