Shingles From the Nehalem

Mr. Thos. North, whose home is near Kist, a post office in the mountains beyond Buxton, was in town Friday with a load of excellent cedar shingles of his own manufacture, which he sold to the dealer, T. A. Ritchey.

Mr. North's shingles are equal to any on the market, being carefully made from select cedar timber of which he has available many thousand feet on his ranch. For operating the necessary machinery the power is taken from a small creek and utilized in various ways. The profits on the products from this remote section are greatly discounted owing to the distance to a market, this being the nearest and it requires four days to make the round trip.

A veteran of the Civil war, well along in years—yet quite hale, Mr. North seems active, and able for the endurance these trips require. At the time of enlisting in the war he was a compositor on an eastern paper and he says that he yet has a liking for the profession that he forsook in order to serve his country in the troublesome days of '61.

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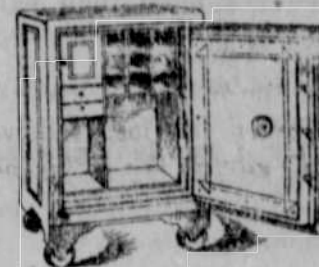
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
