### Passed Resolutions.

At a meeting of the Stream and Forest, Rod and Gun Club of Forest Grove, Oregon, held at the office of the president on January 10, 1905, the following resolutions were unanimously passed:

- 1.—We oppose to hunting deer with dogs and favor limiting the number to be killed in any one season to three.
- 2.—We favor the hunting of Chinese pheasants with dogs and limit the number any one person may kill in one day to five birds.
- 3.—We believe that twenty ducks per day for each hunter should be the limit established by law.
- 4.—We are strongly in favor of prohibiting the sale of any game whatever at any time of the year.
- 5.—We favor a hunter license of One Dollar for each person.
- 6.—We are utterly opposed to the present law of State Game Warden and favor a County Warden for each county and that the salary and expenses of said Game Warden be paid out of the hunter license and that the present appropriation for the salary and expenses of the State Game Warden be apportioned to each county in the state for the maintenance of County Game Wardens.

### Improvement at Central.

Grant Hughes, proprietor of the Independent telephone lines, has decided to make some improvements in the service. When a patron rings central and asks for a number it will not be necessary for central to stay on the line until the desired party answers, thus detaining someone else, but will be at liberty to attend to other rings. When the party rung for answers, under the new service, a light at central will notify her, and when the parties talking are through and hang up the receiver, the light will go out thus notifying central that the line is clear. This will modify the present service materially and make it more prompt besides.

### New Lodge at Banks.

Some twelve members of Washington lodge No. 48 I. O. O. F., of this place, went out to Banks last Saturday and spent most of the day in instituting a lodge at that place. The charter members will number 28, however, only 20 received the degrees. E. E. Sharon, Grand Secretary, of Portland, was present and instructed the members in the mysteries of that order. The new lodge will be known as Jericho lodge No. 183. A fine banquet was served and all had a good time.

### Haines' New Safe

If a safe can be burglar proof, the Haines banking house has certainly got one that is. Saturday night they received by express from Portland a safe manufactured in New York and made of Manganese steel, the finest and hardest metal known to men of today. The construction of the safe is unlike that of many others. It looks more like a large dynamo than a safe. There are no square corners, no cracks about the door. The door is round and when it is drawn in place by the aid of a crank it is almost beyond the detection of the eye where it comes together. It sets in the front window and can be inspected by anyone. The vault which was shattered by the explosion is being overhauled before the safe is put into it.

The Forest Grove Fire Department at its last meeting decided to give a grand ball at Vert's hall on the evening of Friday, January 27. The boys promise that this will eclipse anything in this line ever attempted here. It will be an all night dance and the music will be furnished by Walker's popular orchestra, which in itself is an assurance of a good time. ### Railroad Rumbings

Tillamook City held an enthusiastic meeting Tuesday for the purpose of taking preliminary steps toward getting a line of railroad into that city. A proposition from the Oregon Traction Company was read. Tillamook needs a railroad and their only hope lies in getting an extension from this place.

The S. P. Company has shipped the gasoline motor car from the manufacturers in Kansas. When it arrives it will be put on service from Portland to this city.

The Oregon Traction company have let the contract for the construction work on the line between here and Portland, to the San Francisco company representation which were over the route two weeks ago.

Secretary Gould and Wm French of the O. T. C. have been in this city the past week closing up some contracts for stock in that road.

The surveying crew that is already in the field on the Portland end of the new electric line, are making the final measurements etc. They are accompanied by a cook wagon and other necessities of life, so that the work can be carried on without interruption.

### Takes His Seat as Mayor of Forest Grove, Tonight.

The Oregonian of yesterday contained the announcement of the intention of the Portland Consolidated Railway Company to tap Washington county. This makes the third proposed rapid transit line to be builded here. The above company is amply able to build a road of this kind, and its appearance in this field will no doubt hasten the efforts of the other two.

### Died

Orin E. Rutherford, aged 35 years, died at the asylum in Salem Sunday evening, and the body brought here for burial on Wednesday. Deceased was taken to that institution some three months ago but never got any better. He leaves a wife and two children in this place. He was a member of the Christian church from which he was buried Wednesday evening. He was also a member of the local lodge of W. O. W. and Holly circle.

Deceased was born in Nebraska Aug. 27, 1870 and came to Oregon a little more than four years ago. He was married to Miss Lilly Maude Stanbridge, and became a member of the Christian church the first winter he was in Oregon. About eight months ago his health began to decline, and gradually his physical and mental powers gave away, and on Sunday evening, January 15, 1905, he closed his eyes in death.

### New Pastor Coming.

The Christian church of this city, which has been without a regular pastor since the resignation of Rev. Zimmerman, at a recent meeting, chose Rev. Sanderson of Grants Pass, to fill the pulpit for the present year. Mr. Sanderson will arrive today and make arrangements to move his family here. Rev. Sanderson is a brother of Dean Sanderson of the Eugene Divinity school and comes highly recommended and is an energetic church worker.

### Passed a Liquor Ordinance.

The city council met in special session Monday evening. The roll call showed all present except Councilman Hughes. The mayor stated the meeting was called for the further consideration of the pending Ordinance Bill A and for the transaction of any other business.

The bill of B. P. Welch for services for defence of Walter Hoge et al city officers in case A. G. Watson for \$50 was read and on motion of Councilman Starret was laid on the table.

A communication from the Congregational church in regard to the bell was read and on motion of Councilman Johnson was referred to the special committee.

Ordinance bill "A" passed by the city council, Monday is an ordinance "To suppress, regulate and prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors and intoxicating compounds in the city of Forest Grove." The first section in which is embodied, in brief, the purpose of the ordinance follows: "It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, barter, give away or exchange any spiritous, malt, vinous, fermented, or other intoxicating liquors or intoxicating compounds in the city of Forest Grove, unless such person shall have a license or druggist permit therefor from the common council of the city of Forest Grove, and no one shall be deemed to be a druggist who has not \$500 in a regular stock of drugs, medicines and compounds, and who is not a registered pharmacist under the laws of the state of Oregon."

The second section says in part, that it is unlawful for any druggist or registered pharmacist, who has a permit from the council, to sell any intoxicants without a prescription from a registered and practising physician, and that the prescription cannot be filled a second time. The vote on the ordinance stood as follows: Ayes, Hollinger, Harris and Starrett. Nays, Stribich and Johnson.

### At Vert's Hall.

At the entertainment to be given at Vert's Hall to-morrow night, the illustrated songs with colored slides will be a crowning feature. These have been secured from a Portland play house. All the other numbers are said to be "top-notchers." The Walker brothers have a musical sketch that is an original offering for this place. They introduce the Australian zither and the Bottlophone. "Pushed into Politics," is the title of a comedy sketch, replete with local coloring, and is sure to please. Mrs. McNutt, Mr. Wirtz, and Dale Adams, do some excellent acting in this selection.

### Home Bakery Opened.

The Home Bakery opened for business Tuesday. The rooms are neatly papered and painted. The first batch of bread was baked and was soon exhausted. Fresh bread, cakes, pies etc., will always be kept. A short order lunch counter will be added where anyone can be served at all hours. The proprietors, Purdin & Hepner, are well pleased with the way business has begun and predict a good business after they are once established.

### Broke His Leg.

Tuesday, as Pete Van Dersander, who resides near Verboort, was driving home in his wagon, the front wheels suddenly went into a chuckhole, throwing M. Van Dersander out and permitting the wagon to pass over his leg, causing a serious break. The accident occurred near Gordon's place, a few miles north of this city.
