To Establish New Mail Route.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Second Assistant Postmaster General until March 7, 1905, for carrying the U. S. mails for the term from March 27, 1905 to June 30, 1906, on the following described route, including the depositing and collecting of mail along thereon, by the schedule stated, on such other schedule of like-running time as the Postmaster General may prescribe. From Gree ille to Forest Grove, 5 miles and back, 6 times a week. Leave Greenville daily, except Sunday, at 4:45 a.m. Arrive at Forest Grove in 1 hour and 50 minutes. Leave Forest Grove daily, except Sunday, on receipt of mail from Portland, but not later than 9:45 a. m. Arrive at Greenville in one hour and 50 minutes. Bond required with bid \$800.

Notice to Taxpayers

Collections of taxes for Washington county will begin Monday, Feb. 27, 1905. All those paying taxes in full before March 15, will be entitled to a rebate of three per cent. All those paying one half of their taxes before the first Monday in April are privileged to let the other half run without penalty for six months.
