roads we have delays, accidents and vexation of spirit to boot and with good roads comfort and all the developmental advantages of the higher life.

In the light of such facts it is surely safe to say that the day of indifference to interests in good roads is past. With more business-like methods in farming, closer economies, and larger capitalization and the stress of increasing keenness of international competition our people cannot and will not overlook the waste involved in poor roads. The movement for the improvement of our highways affects, then, interests that are large, vital and urgent. Not only can there be no abatement of the movement in a progressive community but we are at the opening of an era of road building that must call for such an adaptation of institutions and revision of our practices in taxation as will give adequate support and efficient management towards the realization of modern systems of highways equal to the best found in any country.

The public roads question, too, has vital relations with steam railway and the trolley development. For, comprehensively and adequately conceived of, the railways and the wagon roads are co-ordinate parts of an integral transportation system, in this larger view, under the twentieth century condition of life, comes near being an ultimate test of survival.
