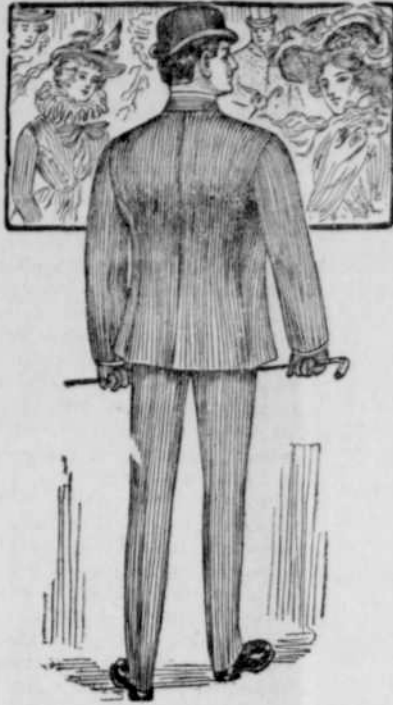
Rebekahs Entertain
