The chief topic, however, of her address was "The Present Condition of Temperance Legislation in Our County and State." What we need is not better laws, but a public sentiment to secure the enforcement of the good laws now on the statute book. The rest of the hour was filled with a spirited discussion of these laws, and of one present local condition.

It is announced that temperance is to have a few days allotted to it upon the official program of the Portland Fair. The time will be divided among the W. C. T. U., Anti-Saloon League, Oratorical Contests, and possibly other departments. Speakers of National fame will no doubt be secured for the occasion.
