

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY

At Regular Monthly Meeting Attention is Called to Increased Need of Water Supply

Monday afternoon the Executive Committee of the Civic Improvement Society held its regular monthly meeting in the President's office, Marsh Hall. With the committee there were present the chairmen of standing committees and as guests, E. S. Calendar, and Thomas H. Adams. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and reports of several committees were given. Encouraging progress was reported in the work of removal of barns which are on the streets and the destruction of old fences. Not only is this work gratifying to the organization but it is a benefit to all our citizens and an advertisement of our town to all who visit Forest Grove.

Some time was spent in discussing the needs of the city in regard to better sanitation and an increased water supply in the near future. Some little solicitude was expressed by different members with regard to the condition of the creek some distance above this place from which the supply is taken. Negligence of property owners along the stream even at a distance from Forest Grove might bring upon the citizens an epidemic of fever, especially during the summer.

The cooperation of all our citizens is desired in the work of reporting any carelessness in the matter of contaminating the creek. It was also urged that within the city limits the citizens should use care in the matter of sink spouts and drains.

In a discussion on the importance of improving our streets and highways, Mr. Calendar said we should not be weary in doing, and Mr. Adams at some length described the process of preparing oiled roads from his own study of the subject in California. In beautifying our own city he recommended some of the California methods of uniformity in kind of trees, concrete walks and a fire limit under direction of the council. In California it is not so much the expenditure of large sums of money as the enthusiasm for improvement that makes a town attractive.

CENTENNIAL NOTES

"Hit the Trail" at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, opening in Portland, June 1.

Foundations are being laid for an annex to the Administration building and for the post office and express office at the Lewis and Clark fair.

Elaborate clusters of electric lights representing the final touches to the Bridge of Nations at the Exposition, are now being placed in position.

All exhibits for California's participation in the Lewis and Clark Exposition, were shipped from that state April 15.

The famous Boston-Montana band, of 35 pieces, composed entirely of the underground miners from Butte, Mont., will attend the Lewis and Clark fair. The band was organized twenty years ago and ranks with the best musical organizations of the country.

Two men who will participate in the rock-drilling contest at the Lewis and Clark Exposition enjoy enviable records. In fifteen minutes this team drilled through 37 inches of hard, tough granite. The men are husky miners from the Galice district in Southern Oregon.

A large tower is being erected over Guild's Lake at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Upon this will be placed a search-light, the rays of which will be cast about the grounds at night and greatly enhance the lighting features of the Centennial.

A feature of the Oriental displays at the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be a large sandalwood temple, which in the East India building at the St. Louis Exposition, attracted much attention. The building has been shipped and will be erected at the Centennial within another week.

The itinerary of the Missouri Valley Medical excursion to the American Medical Association convention in Portland, during the Lewis and Clark Exposition, has been decided upon. A week will be spent in the Yellowstone National Park and two days in Seattle and Tacoma.

ORDINANCE NO. 143.

An Ordinance to prevent bulls, boars, rams and other male animals from serving female animals in view of the public within the City limits of the City of Forest Grove, Washington County, Oregon

The City of Forest Grove does Ordain as follows: Section 1. That no owner or other person in charge of any bull, boar, ram or other male animal shall, within the City limits of the City of Forest Grove, Washington County, Oregon, permit or allow such bull, boar, ram or other male animal to serve any female animal within the corporate limits of said city, unless said service be within a barn or other tight enclosure so as to be out of the view of the public.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and may be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars, or not less than two days imprisonment in the City jail, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court, and in default of payment of such fine may be imprisoned in the City jail of said City one day for every two dollars of such fine, unless the same be sooner paid.

This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage by the common council of the City of Forest Grove, Oregon, and its approval by the Mayor of said city and due publication.

The town of Grants Pass in Oregon has brought itself into commendable notice. Within the business center of this town there has been a leprous spot. Four saloons, side by side, beginning at a street corner furnished a loafing place. Men drunken and profane congregated there by day and night. Decent men disliked to pass that way and decent women found it dangerous. Then decency began to talk. Then the council and police put their heads together. Since the saloons were doing a lawful business, that business in itself must not be meddled with. A paint pot and brush were called into service. Great red lines, four inches wide, were drawn across the pavement so as to include the leprous territory within their bounds. Inside that territory no man might tarry unless he desired to be arrested. The corner is cleared. If the Grants Pass officials keep up the fight the saloons may themselves get on the other side the dead-line, when, we trust, there will still be enough red paint for more lines.—The New Voice.

Several other states are now seeking local option laws through the state Legislatures, among them Minnesota, Wisconsin, Colorado and Washington.

Ohio has three forms of local option laws. Four hundred and fifty-three towns out of seven hundred and sixty-three have no saloons, and over 900 townships out of about 1,400 are "dry." During the year 1904, 793 saloons have been put out of business.
