Future and Safe Purchased and Business Will Open Soon—T. H. Adams President.

Cornelius State Bank is the name of the new banking institution which will open in that thriving little city in a few weeks and it is backed by men whose wealth will aggregate upwards of \$150,000. The bank will start with a paid up capital of \$15,000.

Woods & Adams former and well known business men of this city are the principal stock holders, however, Cornelius parties will have stock also.

Mr. T. H. Adams, who is president, is counted as one of Forest Grove's most careful business men, and he will have charge of the bank. He was in Portland a few days this week and purchased a fine manganese steel, burglar proof safe, an inch thicker than any safe in the county, besides a fire-proof vault, all of which will arrive at Cornelius shortly. The bank has leased the Weidewitsch building on Base Line street, just opposite the depot, and are having good comfortable quarters arranged.

Cornelius is centrally located and is a good shipping point where lots of business is done, and a banking house will no doubt be a paying institution from the start.

TO TEST THEIR WINGS

Commencement Exercises at Pacific University Begin Tomorrow and Continues One Week

Splendid Program is Prepared by all Departments Which Will Give Evidence of Students' Long and Careful Training—Prominent Persons Including Gov. Chamberlain Will be Present.

The commencement exercises of Pacific University will begin tomorrow and continue during the next six days. This has been a successful year for the school. Nine will receive their diplomas and pass out into the world to try their own wings. The Academy will also have its usual closing exercises which will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 2 p. m.

The program opens tomorrow at Marsh hall by a recital by the pupils of the Conservatory and also the anniversary of the Conservatory on Saturday evening at 8 p. m. These will be free to the public.

President Ferrin will deliver the baccalaureate sermon on Sunday morning and in the evening the speaker will be Prof. N. P. Drew of Salem.

The art department and literary societies will have their respective places on the program on Monday, while on Tuesday the annual meeting of the trustees, junior class day exercises on the campus, closing exercises of the Academy and the anniversary of Associate Alumni and the latter will be addressed by Rev. Horace Ramsey of Portland. An essay by Miss Mildred M. Tibbals of Salt Lake City and singing by Millard O. Lownsdale will be the principal features of the evening. A banquet will follow.

Wednesday at 10 a. m. the University graduating exercises will be held. The annual business meeting of the alumni and the corporation dinner in the parlor of the Congregational church at 1 o'clock. At these last exercises

Gov. Geo. E. Chamberlain will be present, but is not on the program for any address.

The commencement festivities will be closed by the Commencement Concert which will be something out of the ordinary in this line at 8 p. m. in Marsh Hall, after which the annual Alumni Ball will be given in Vert's hall.


Other brick buildings are being talked of on Pacific Avenue but as yet nothing definite is known just when they will be started.
