### Weekly Crop Bulletin

Following is the regular weekly summary of the crop conditions in Oregon as compiled by the Portland station of the United States Weather Bureau:

The first of the week was cloudy and cool and good rains fell in nearly all sections of the state. On Wednesday the rains ceased and the remainder of the week was warm and pleasant.

The warm weather and bright sunshine immediately following the rains had a very beneficial effect on all crops, and a marked improvement is noted, especially in the condition of field corn, potatoes and onions, which are growing rapidly. Fall grain continues to head nicely, and barley and rye will soon be ready to cut. Spring wheat and oats are growing satisfactorily. The grain aphid continues numerous in the Willamette Valley and in some portions of Southern Oregon, but so far but little damage has occurred. Gardens and roots show a marked improvement. Grasses are growing rapidly, and some hay has been cut in Southern Oregon. Haying will not become general, however, for about two weeks. Pasture continues in fine condition, and stock is doing fine, especially dairy cattle.

Cherries are ripening slowly, with the yield considerably below average in most sections. Other tree fruit indicate lighter yields than usual, especially peaches, prunes and early apples. Late apples and pears promise better results. Bush fruit is setting nicely and an abundant yield is promised.

Washington County—Cloudy weather has given place to sunshine and all vegetation is making good growth; oats will be very short; hay light; gardens doing finely; stock in good condition; green aphid numerous.

## MOTOR CAR MAKES RUN

First Trip Proves to Be Unsuccessful for the Forest Grove-Portland Run.

New Train Service to be Installed—Large Crowd Sees New Invention.

The S. P. gasoline motor car made its first trip to Forest Grove Friday morning, arriving here at 11:30. News of its coming was spread about town and at the appointed time a large crowd was at the depot when the car, loaded with Engineer Fields and other S. P. officials besides the Hillsboro ladies band and citizens came in.

While here Mr. Fields stated that the car would not be put on this line as at first announced, as it is unable to climb the 4 per cent grade out of Portland. He was willing to do what he could to give Forest Grove a better service and the matter of a stub train service aside from the regular train was discussed. Mr. Fields wished to know what Forest Grove wanted and was told by representative citizens that they thought that a three-trip service would satisfactorily meet the demands, upon which suggestion he promised to bring the matter before the officials of the road and that he would do all he could to grant our request. Should a service of this kind be decided upon the schedule would probably be as follows.

The regular train would leave as usual, one at 11:30, 2:30 and 5:30. Returning leave Portland about 9:30, 12:30, 3:30 and a late train at 10:30 p. m. This is the schedule talked of at the depot and seemed to meet the approval of all.

A stub train run on the above schedule will accommodate the traveling public to a better advantage than the motor car because of its limited capacity, and everyone here wants the trains instead. The cars left for Portland at 12 o'clock.

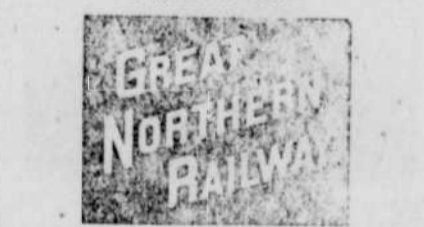
