



## FOR NEW SYSTEM WATER WORKS

Public Meeting to be Called by  
Mayor in Few Days to Dis-  
cuss Project

Regular Meeting of Council Tues-  
day Evening—Fire Limits  
to be Changed

The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening with all members present except Councilman Starrett.

After the routine business was disposed of a committee composed of E. W. Haines, T. A. Adams and A. G. Hoffman, from the Civic Improvement Society occupied the attention of the council on the subject of a new system of water works. It is the plan of this society to agitate the furnishing of pure, wholesome water, as it has been discovered that Gales Creek, where our supply comes from, is anything but pure. The proposition is to carry our water from some creek back in the mountains, some eight miles through a main, which insures its purity, besides the gravity obtained would be sufficient—in fact it would be better than what we now have. The committee asked that the mayor appoint a day on which to call a mass-meeting of the citizens for the purpose of discussing the project. Mayor Johnson has not named a day yet but has promised to do so in the near future.

The ordinance committee offered an ordinance extending the fire limits about town, and same has had its first reading. It is probable that the limits will be extended even farther than the present ordinance calls for, as there is a movement on foot to include other portions of the town, which, if that is done, will practically cover the whole of the business district.

A resolution was passed giving the

merchants five days in which to clean up in the rear of their places of business.

## THE GRIM REAPER'S HARVEST Four Deaths During the Past Week In And About Forest Grove

Mrs. Ida Belle Dempsey Hinman died at her home in this city, last Thursday afternoon at 4:30 after a lingering illness of consumption, at the age of 36 years. Deceased was born in Yamhill County, August 24, 1869. She leaves besides her husband an adopted daughter, mother and sisters. The funeral was held Saturday at 10 o'clock and the remains were laid to rest in Buxton cemetery. Rev. L. F. Belknap officiating.

David C. Stewart, an old resident and pioneer, son of Benjamin E. Stewart, who crossed the plains in 1847, died at his farm home near this city Friday night after long suffering from cancer of the stomach. He was born in Ohio, Sept 8, 1840, and came to Oregon with his parents. They settled in Yamhill County, which was the home of the deceased until 1879, when he bought a farm near this city and has been a resident here ever since. Besides the widow, he left two sons, Horace D. and Loring V. Stewart, both residents of Grant county, and a daughter, Mrs. Emma, wife of Professor C. E. Bradley, of Pacific University; also two brothers and a sister living in Grant county.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with burial in the Naylor cemetery. Senator E. W. Haines delivered an appropriate address over the remains. Deceased was a director of Vert's Liberal hall in this city.

Miss Rosalee Wilson died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Wilson, Tuesday evening after an illness of eight months, at the age of 18. The funeral was conducted this morning at 10 o'clock and the interment was at Naylor's cemetery. Rev. C. F. Sanderson officiating.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hurst Hemsted died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. Swanson, in this city at 5 o'clock, Wednesday morning after an illness of only one week, at the age of 73 years. Deceased was born in Carlisle, England, and when she reached the age of discretion she united with the M. E. Church. Twenty-five years ago together with her husband and three children, she came to America and had resided here many years. She leaves a husband and two daughters, Mrs. H. Swanson, and Mrs. E. M. Ward. The husband is an invalid at the home of the latter.

The funeral services will be held at the house this afternoon at 3 p. m. Rev. Clapp, officiating. The remains will be interred in Naylor's cemetery.

### New Directors for Pacific.

At the July meeting of the board of directors of Pacific University held at Portland, four new trustees were added to the board. They are:

Judge C. E. Wolverton, of the Oregon Supreme Court; Hon. Bela S. Huntington, of The Dalles; Principal J. R. Wilson, of Portland Academy; Rev. W. C. Kantner, of the First Congregational Church, Salem and Senator E. W. Haines of Forest Grove.

These new members indicate an actual increase of four in the number of trustees, raising it to 18. Senator Haines fills the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Benton Killin. The board now lacks only one name of the full quota permitted by the charter of the institution.

All the new trustees are well known to the people of Oregon, and have been prominent in public life for many years. President Ferrin and other members of the faculty are especially gratified because several of the men chosen come from sections of the state that have not been represented heretofore.

### Pacific Gets \$10 000

President Ferrin Friday announced that the institution has just received a gift of \$10,000 from Mrs. Lieutenant Cabell, Miss Henrietta Failing and Mary F. Failing, the daughters of the late Henry Failing. The money will be added to the general endowment fund of the university.

Henry Failing, for over 20 years, was treasurer of Pacific University, and a member of the board of trustees. Largely through his careful management, the institution managed to preserve its funds intact through the hard times a few years ago. Mr. Failing did not receive a cent for his arduous efforts on behalf of Pacific University, and often gave liberally for its support. In making their present gift to Pacific, the daughters of Mr. Failing state that they are simply carrying out his wish, expressed before his death.

### Temperance Lecture

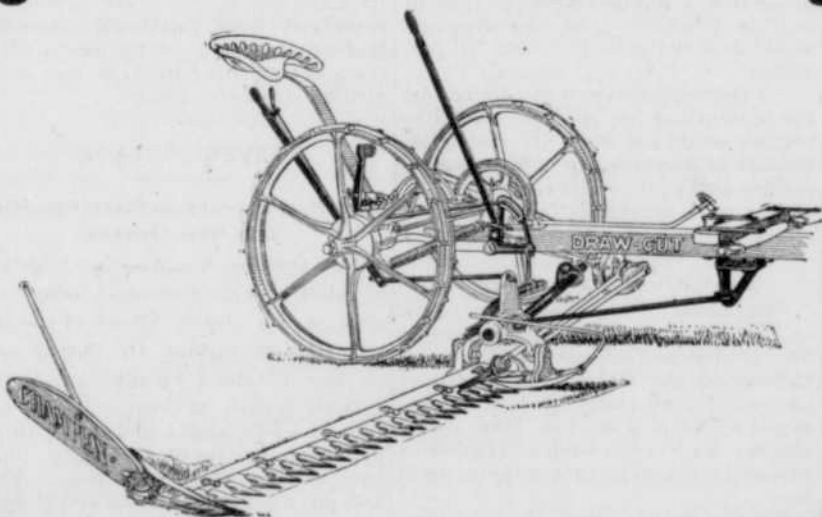
