PARTY ORGANIZATION.

It is the general impression that the primary law to be tried in this state next spring for the first time, does away with all party organization, thus leaving the various political parties without any mode of government or to transact any party business.

Section 43. There shall be elected by each political party subject to this law at said primary nominating election a committeeman for each election precinct. The committeeman thus elected shall be the representative of his political party in and for such precinct in all ward or subdivision committees that may be formed.
