ICE PLANT AND STORAGE

Johnson & McNamer Willing to Install Plant Here.

A. W. Johnson and Con McNamer are gathering information looking to the establishing an ice plant and cold storage in this city. They have been inspecting other plants and are of the opinion it would pay here. To install a first-class plant and ample storage room for all products, it would cost about \$7,000. A convenience of this kind would be a welcome acquisition and it is to be hoped they will decide to drive their stakes here.

The board of trade stands ready to assist in any way it can and other individuals have signified their willingness to aid in the matter.

The plant would consist of ice-making machinery, cold storage for beef, butter and eggs, vegetables and all other products that become necessary to keep cool.

PUBLIC SCHOOL OPENS MONDAY.

Large Enrollment and Corps of Efficient Teachers to Begin Work.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

Following is the regular weekly summary of Oregon crop conditions issued by the Portland station of the United States Weather Bureau:

The long dry spell was broken on the 12th by good rains which fell generally in the western and northern portions of the state. These rains were supplemented by showers in scattered places on the 13th, 16th and 17th. Some Fall plowing and seeding has been done, but the soil is not soft enough for this work to become general. Light frosts occurred in exposed places on several days, but they did no harm.

Hop-picking is nearly completed and the crop is turning out better than expected. The rains did not injure the hops, but they were detrimental to prunes, the picking and drying of which are well advanced. Reports indicate that the prune crop will be larger than last year, but much less than a full crop. Late apples are ripening and indicate from fair to good yields.

Corn is nearly ripe and it is a good crop. Potatoes are generally free from blight, and the prospects for a good yield of potatoes is much better than they were before the rains set in.

Washington County—Rain during early part of week did a great deal of good and very little damage; plowing has begun in many places, still the ground is quite dry; hop-picking will be done in a few days; the yield is better than was expected; grass has started; some seedling is being done.

Louis Shogren Dies.

After a brief illness of cancer of the eye, Louis Shogren, a well known citizen of this city died Sunday afternoon at about 3 o'clock. He had been suffering from a bad eye and went to the hospital at Portland, but was returned home as nothing could be done. He suffered intense pain until the end came. Deceased was born in Sweden and was aged 66 years at the time of his death. He came to Oregon in 1856 and for eleven years held the position of head mechanic at the Siletz Indian reservation. He moved to Washington County and purchased a farm near Dilley where he lived for 20 years. About eighteen months ago he moved to Forest Grove. He leaves a wife and six children: Mrs. Emmet Quick, of Tillamook; Mrs. Jasper Reeves, of Cornelius; Oscar and Hilda, of Portland; Edith and Frank of this city.

He was a member of the M. E. Church, a devout Christian, a loving husband and father, and his friends are legion. The last rites were pronounced Tuesday morning at the M. E. church by Rev. L. F. Belknap and the remains were deposited in Naylor's cemetery. He was also a Mason.
