A bad runaway occurred at the depot last Thursday night that resulted in killing the large gray horse of Hancock, Gordon & Elliott, the liverymen. Palmer, who was driving the express wagon, had left his team to carry some express into the depot, when the team ran away and headed for town. The 'bus team driven by Clark Brown was on its way to the depot and was near the Colonial Hotel, when the runaways ran into it, running the tongue of the express wagon into the side of the animal about six inches. It was pitch dark and the four animals were piled up together, causing a very exciting experience for all concerned. The injured animal had to be shot.
