RIGHT at the time when Oregon needs a strong delegation in Congress is just when most of its members are on the threshold of the county jail. We need a forty-foot channel to the sea and if instead of feathering their own nests when they thought they wouldn't be caught, the delegation had kept its title clear, Portland wouldn't be depending altogether upon a delegation of her citizens to solicit the needed legislation.


The Roseburg Plaine dealer justly kicks at the keeping of the Land Office closed at that place on the ground that it interferes with the rights of legitimate homesteaders and timber claim purchasers. We ourselves have been nearly three years getting a patent for our timber claim and haven't got it yet for that matter, and for no other reason than that it is being delayed by such apparently uncalled for actions of the government as these.

Under a new statute, the laws enacted at each session of the legislature are published in every paper in the state whose publisher is willing to perform that service for \$100. UNDER THE NEW PRIMARY LAW

What Candidates Must do to Obtain A Nomination for Office

Nominations for state and county offices in Oregon next April, in the republican and the democratic parties, will be made in the manner followed last May in the Portland city primaries. The nominating primaries will be held 45 days before the general election, which will come on the first Monday in June. All nominations will be made by the direct primary method, including those for governor, the legislature and other offices in the state, and for county offices throughout Oregon. The nominating election will be the first general test of the direct primary law.

Candidates for a given nomination will have their names placed on the primary ballot, on petition of at least 2 per cent of their respective vote last cast for representative in congress in their electoral district, and the one who shall receive the highest number of votes in the primary will be the nominee of this party for the office, and will be voted on in the usual manner in the June election.

The number of signatures required on a republican primary petition for a state nomination will be 1000, the maximum required by law; on a democratic petition, 599. Candidates for a republican nomination in the first Congressional district must each secure 479 signatures and in the second district 543. Candidates for the democratic nomination must each obtain 343 signatures in the first district, and 255 in the second. These numbers are based on the vote of each party a year ago for representative in congress.

The signers of a state petition must represent at least one-tenth of the precincts in each of at least seven counties in the state, and the signers of a congressional petition must represent at least one-tenth of the precincts in each of at least one-fourth of the counties in the district. A petition for a county nomination must contain electors residing in at least one-fifth of the precincts in the county. In a district comprising more than one county the signers must represent at least one-eighth of the precincts in each of at least two counties in the district.

It will be seen therefore that the circulation of nominating petitions will be no small task because they will have to be circulated in a number of counties and many precincts.

One county such as Multnomah is not permitted by law to furnish all the signatures on a petition for the nomination of governor nor Multnomah, Linn, Lane, Washington and Marion

combined, because seven counties must be represented on the petition.

The securing of petitions in Washington county, for county offices will not be a very difficult task, as the largest vote cast at the last general election was, republican, 1785, and two per cent of this is only practically 36, however the petitioner must gather his percentage from at least one-fifth of the precincts in the county. It will require only 21 signers for the democratic candidate, six for the prohibitionist, and three for the socialist candidate.
