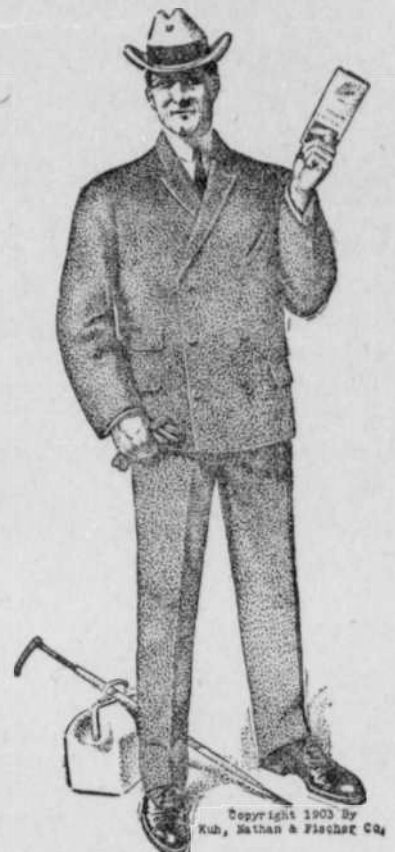

### Hon. Jesse C. Moore.

Hon. Jesse Clemens Moore, aged 75 years, who died at Greenville Wednesday night, of general decline, was an Oregon pioneer of 1852, and a prominent citizen and business man of Washington county.

Born in Fayetteville, Ark., Mr. Moore, in 1852, started for California, but on the way, owing to the scarcity of food for cattle, changed his plans and came to Oregon, reaching Portland after a trip of six months and 17 days. He then came to Greenville, where he resided as farmer, business man and official almost continuously ever since.

In 1862 he married Miss Rachel S. Wilson. He was elected Assessor, and afterward Sheriff for three terms.

In 1877 he purchased an interest in the Greenville store in the firm of Pierce & Moore. In 1888 Mr. Moore was elected a member of the State Legislature, and was re-elected a second time. Deceased was a member of the Masonic fraternity.

Mrs. Moore died in 1880, leaving four children, and in 1882 Mr. Moore married Miss Jenny Wilson, who survives him with two children. The children are: William L. Moore, postmaster at Greenville; Miss Anne M. Moore, Greenville; Mrs. A. W. Balsiger, White Salmon, Wash; Frederick C. Moore, Seattle, Wash; Jesse C. Moore, Jr., and Max W. Moore, of Greenville.

The funeral took place at Wilkes' cemetery Friday, under the auspices of Loyalty Lodge No. 6, A. F. & A. M., of Hillsboro.

### Reunion of Oregon Mounted Volunteers.

Last Saturday was the 50th anniversary of Co., D, First Regiment Oregon Mounted Volunteers, and, pursuant to a public call, six survivors out of a company of 104 met in the auditorium of the courthouse at Hillsboro. Col. Cornelius was in command of the company that mustered in in that city, October 14, 1855, and started for the Yakima. The six present Saturday were Lieut. W. H. Myers, Forest Grove; William R. Barrett, Hillsboro; William Kane, Forest Grove; Jabez Wilkes, Hillsboro; Thomas J. Phillips, Alsea, Or., and Paul D. Shakelford, Beaverton.

Lieutenant Myers was elected chair-

man, and Jabez Wilkes was elected secretary. The following resolution was unanimously adopted and sent to Senator C. W. Fulton:

We, survivors of Company D, First Regiment, Oregon Mounted Volunteers, Yakima Indian War of 1855-56, assembled in Hillsboro, Or., this 14th day of October, 1905, the 50th anniversary of company organization, do hereby petition the Hon. Senator C. W. Fulton, United States Senator for Oregon, to use his best offices to cause to be introduced into Congress a bill to place the surviving veterans of the Yakima Indian War on the pension rolls with the same pensions enjoyed by the survivors of the Mexican War.
