### Liquor Question Renewed.

The liquor question at Forest Grove has again injected itself into the legal channels of the Circuit Court, and, judging from the complaints filed, Pacific University is this time after results which they hope will give them real property as well as a cessation of the sale of liquors in the college town.

The University, through its attorney, Milton W. Smith, has filed suit against Charles F. Miller and Dr. Charles Hines, both of whom conduct drug-stores on Forest Grove's main business street, asking the court to return them the property used by the two defendants. The allegations do not touch upon the liquor question, merely stating that Pacific University is the owner in fee simple of the property and that Miller, on one tract, and Hines, on another, hold possession contrary to the rights of the college.

This means that the University will attempt to get the property's title through reversion because of liquor sales, contrary to what they call a restriction in the deeds.

Two other pieces of property were also asked for, one being now occupied by Mort Hallett and another by James Johnson, both of these places, according to popular legend, being conducted as a sort of "blind pigs."

That the defendants will put up a fight and carry the matter to a court of last resort is not only conjectured but expected.—Oregonian.
