RAILWAY IS A REALITY

Lytle is to Complete Twenty Miles of Railroad in Eight Months

Work at Hillsboro—Line to Touch Four Harbors—Loop to be Built Via Wilson River

It appears now that the railway rumors of months past have become railway realities. E. E. Lytle, presi-dent of the Pacific Railway & Naviga-tion company, has announced his intention to complete 20 miles of rail-road in eight months. He expects to have more than 250 men at work on the grade, and by December 31, the first five miles will be completed. The enterprise is to be prosecuted with dispatch. Material is being de-livered for the bridges and with com-paratively favorable weather, no delay of any consequence will be encoun-tered. The contract under which E. E. Lytle took the Hillsboro franchise and right of way requires that 10 miles be completed by May 1, and 10 miles additional by July 1.

Willis E. Potter of Portland, has been awarded the contracts for tim-ber, ties and other saw mill products. Mr. Lytle has stated that the road would not end in Hillsboro but would be built on to Portland.

The route follows the Nehalem river to Nehalem, sweeps down the coast to Tillamook and forms a loop returning eastward via the Wilson River to a connection with the main line near Buxton. The line is to touch four harbors—Portland, Astoria, Nehalem Bay and Tillamook Bay.

The Wilson River route will, no doubt become a favorite road to the ocean beach.

At Hillsboro, the work has begun in earnest. A gang of 35 Greeks arrived here yesterday and more are to come during the week. Monday 50 Chinese will be added to the force.
