TEMPERANCE TALKS

BY THE W. C. T. U.

Internal Revenue Edict Will Bar Many Kinds from Drug Stores.

On and after April 1 of next year Atwood's LaGrippe Specific, Cuban gingeric, DeWitt's stomach bitters, Dr. Bouvier's buchu gin, Dr. Fowler's meat and malt, Duffy's malt whisky, Gilbert's rejuvenating iron and herb juice, Hostetter's stomach bitters, Kudros, Peruna, and Rockandy cough cure, will not be found on the shelves of many, if any, local drug stores. These compounds are declared by the internal revenue department to contain so little of medicine of any kind that they do not properly come within the medicine class. Consequently, all who offer them for sale will be required to take out a special license as rectifiers, which will cost \$25.

The internal revenue analysis of these compounds, says they are composed chiefly of distilled spirits or mixtures thereof. Circular No. 673, issued by the internal revenue department, says in part:

"Because these preparations were held out to the public as medicines, does not afford ground for relieving their manufacturers from special tax as rectifiers and wholesale liquor dealers, and does not relieve the retail dealers therein from special tax as retail liquor dealers, under the provisions of the federal statutes."

Continuing, the circular adds: "It is held that statutes require the exacting of this special tax from the manufacturer of every compound composed of distilled spirits, even though drugs are declared to have been added thereto, when their presence is not discoverable by chemical analysis, or it is found that the quantity of drugs in the preparation is so small as to have no appreciable effect on the alcoholic liquor of which the compound is mainly or largely composed."

"The same ruling applies to every alcoholic compound labeled as a remedy for diseases and containing, in addition to distilled spirits, only substances or ingredients which, however large their quantity, are not of a character to impart any medicinal quality to the compound; but where substances undoubtedly medicinal in their character are combined with whiskey or other alcoholic liquor and used in sufficient quantity to give a medicinal quality to the liquor, other than that which it may inherently possess, such compound is, of course, not to be included in this ruling."

The Wabash Railroad and Liquor Drinking Employees.

The Wabash railroad has issued one of the most sweeping orders against the use of intoxicants by its employees that has ever been announced by any railroad. Its workmen are forbidden to even enter a place where liquors are sold. Experience warns the railroad company that they who drink at all are not trustworthy employees.

Temperance.

Between a marked falling off in consumption and a marked increase of severity in enforcement of the law against adulterations, the liquor trade in Great Britain is far from happy.
