Internal Revenue Edict Will Bar Many Kinds from Drug Stores.

The internal revenue analysis of these compounds, says they are composed chiefly of distilled spirits or mixtures thereof. Circular No. 673, ssued by the internal revenue department, says in part:

"Because these preparations were held out to the public as medicines, act of August 4, 1892, John H. Balmanno, of Portland does not afford ground for relieving their manufacturers from special tax as ectifiers and wholesale liquor dealers, and does not relieve the retail dealers therein from special tax as retail liquor dealers, under the provisions of the federal statutes."

Continuing, the circular adds: s held that statutes require the exacting of this special tax from the manufacturer of every compound composed of distilled spirits, even though drugs are declared to have been added thereto, when their presence is not discoverable by chemical analysis, or it is found that the quantity of drugs in the preparation is so small as to have no appreciable effect on the alcoholic liq-The reception given by the Woman's | uor of which the compound is mainly
