Mrs. C. F. Day, who was here on a visit with Mrs. F. F. Knight, died last Sunday evening of typhoid fever. Mrs. Day had just come from Corvallis where she had tended and nursed three children, tried to save them from the fever and were carried away by it, when she was taken sick by the same disease. She could not withstand the illness on top of her losses and so passed away on the evening of April 8, 1906.
The remains were taken to Corvallis on the Tuesday morning train.

Mrs. Emma Pomeroy-Ross of this place died suddenly last evening of heart failure. Mrs. Ross has been a resident of Forest Grove for a number of years and her ancestors were among the very earliest pioneers of this part of Oregon.
