SCHOOLS GET THE BENEFIT.

Library Commission Issues a List of Three Veins of High Grade Bituminous Books Ready for Purchase.

Salem-The State Library commision has just issued a pamphlet containing the list of books for school libraries for the state. The list includes 37 stendard books by the best authors, from which the school boards may choose books for the school libraries.

In accordance with the state law, the ibrary commission recently called for bids to supply about \$15,000 worth of books to the schools of the state, this amount being the sum total of the li- richest coal mines in Oregon, if not in brary tax for the entire state.

The bid accepted reduced the price of all books from 15 to 30 per cent. The schools get the benefit of this reduction by ordering from the list prepared by the commission. Books treating on all subjects suitable for pupils in the public schools are included in the list. By the terms of the contract the books are delivered to the county seat of each county at the price named in the list. Each school district in the state will select books such as they desire according to the amount of money they have The canal supply bill will be debated to expend. 
