Whithycombe Takes Defeat Gracefully.

Dr. James Withycombe takes his defeat for the Governorship philosophically, and the Chamberlain majestically apparently does not rankle. He has no complaint to make of his treatment. When he was reached over the long distance telephone at North Yamhill last night, Dr. Withycombe said: "It's a fortune of war, I guess. The administration of Governor Chamberlain has been satisfactory to the people, and his popularity throughout the state was, no doubt, a strong factor in his election. To these two things, more than to anything else, I attribute my defeat."

"I have no complaint to make. I was fairly treated and have no feeling whatever over the result. I want to express my sincere gratitude to those who supported me in all parts of the state. I believe principles are far above men, and as in the past I shall continue to be a loyal advocate and supporter of Republican ideas of government. I think the general results of the election are very good. We will have as strong a Legislature as we have ever had, made up of representative men."

"I think the election showed the complete success of the primary law and proved that it is a desirable addition to our state laws."
