MRS. E. H. MARSH, DEAD.

Was a Pioneer of 1860. Wife of First President of Pacific University.

Mrs. Eliza H. Marsh died Friday morning at 5 o'clock at her home in this city at the age of 65 years. For several years she had been an invalid, and the end was not altogether unexpected. Mrs. Marsh was born in Bloomfield, O., the daughter of George H. Haskell, a substantial farmer in that town. In the year 1860 she became the wife of Sidney Harper Marsh and soon after came to Oregon, where she resided continuously until the time of her death. Her husband was the first president of Pacific University, holding the position for 25 years until his death in 1879. Through his influence more than any other the university was firmly established and given the position which it holds today, at the head of the private schools of the state.

For more than 40 years Mrs. Marsh was actively identified with the life of Forest Grove, and was recognized as a leading figure in it. By her sweet womanly disposition, her kindly interest in the welfare of the students and her wise counsels for all she will be remembered by multitudes throughout Oregon who were brought under her influence during their student days. Throughout her long illness, when no longer able to take an active part in public affairs, she retained a keen interest in all that was transpiring around her.

Nine children were born to President and Mrs. Marsh three of whom are now living—J. Wheelock Marsh, editor of the Hilo Tribune, Hawaii; George Haskell Marsh, deputy clerk in the United States Federal court, Portland, and Winifred, the wife of Professor Theodore Whittlesey, of the Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.

Found Dead in Bed.

Miss Alice Rehberg, aged 22 years, was found dead in her bed at her father's residence in Tigardville last Wednesday. Deceased retired Tuesday evening in excellent health and no one heard her complain in any way. The coroner summoned a jury to investigate the cause of death.
