Hillsboro.

The city council met last night and passed an ordinance bringing before the people at the December election the proposition of purchasing a city park for \$2000. It is quite likely that the measure will carry.

Will Survey Land to Fix Assessment.

The county board of equalization has adjourned, and contrary to usual custom has left no unfinished business for the board of commissioners to complete.

There were no changes of any importance made in the original assessment roll. The \$300 household exemption was allowed to stand, but the court will order the surveyor to make surveys and report on all cases where the amount of assessed tillable land is in dispute. This was quietly done in one case and the report was much at variance with the statement made by the landowner before the board. The rule will have a wholesome effect.

Mrs. Geo. Bidwell Dead.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Geo. W. Bidwell, who died Sunday morning, was held at Hillsboro Wednesday. Deceased had been in her usual health and about 5 o'clock Sunday morning awakened and talked with her husband. Both dropped asleep. About an hour later Mr. Bidwell was awakened by a strange noise. Trying to arouse Mrs. Bidwell, he soon discovered that she had passed away. Three children survive: George H. Bidwell of Portland; Mrs. Blanche Hamilton of Independence; and Miss Florence Bidwell of Hillsboro. Deceased was born in Pennsylvania in 1844, and moved to Wisconsin with her parents in 1854. In 1869 she was married to Mr. Bidwell, later moving to Clear Lake, Wis., from which place they came to Oregon in 1905.

EQUALIZERS PASSED TAX ROLL

Washington County Assessor Had Finished Work Before Decision

County Judge Goodin is getting legal advice from Deputy District Attorney Tongue as to what should be done in the matter of the Washington County tax roll for the present year. The exemption of \$300 was allowed and the claim that this will invalidate the assessment is receiving consideration. It is not thought that the legality of the roll can be attacked, for, officials argue, it simply means that in each instance there is \$300 worth of property which is not on the roll. A Sheriff's assessment can cure this but on top of this is the fact that there are many not on the taxroll because the exemption covers the sum total of many parties' property.

The County Assessor already had his assessment made so far as the field work was concerned, before the Supreme Court decided against the exemption. The Assessor therefore wrote the assessment with the exemption allowed and left it to the Board of equalization to cure, if that body thought it proper to annul the exemptions. The board, however, let the assessment stand. Even with the exemptions allowed the tax roll is the largest in point of valuation ever written in the history of the county.
