city plant, and of the running of the engine at the power house. He said that the company was doing its best to furnish the city with lights at the present time and were under an enormous expense. If all runs as expected he promised the best of lights. It was plainly seen that the company was doing the best within its power and he asked that the council be lenient with them, and in a few days all would be in good running shape. When asked concerning the arc lights which had not been on for some time, and the dimness of the incandescents, the president spoke of the perfect service that had been given to the city before the damage to the dam, and many present took exception to his remarks and asked the mayor to be heard.

The councilmen differed when it came time to take action on this subject, as some thought that the present light, were of some help and gave the city an encouragement (just like getting a letter from home, as one said) while others wished to stop the system until needed repairs could be made.

The council then agreed to be lenient with the company and to wait until the next regular meeting to consider the matter of rebates.

Upon promise of the best possible service, the council agreed to wait until the last of the week or through the necessary time before final action be taken. Meeting adjourned until next monthly session.
