The minutes of the council proceedings show that the city fathers indulged a "lively discussion" at their meeting Tuesday evening, anent the electric lights of this city. Discussions are all right when they terminate in some action, but from the past it is gleaned that several such discussions have occurred without any action. That the lights here are poor nobody can deny. What the conditions are that makes them poor does not matter to the council. The simple question remains: Is the city getting what it pays for, or do its patrons get what they pay for? If they do not, in the slang of the street, it is up to the council to see that they do. During the past summer no less than four of our merchants have installed some other than electric lights in their places of business all because of the inferior quality of the lights the city furnishes. This state of affairs is serious as it cuts off the city's revenue and if permitted to continue there can be but one result—the city will lose its patronage. What are you going to do about it?

The Oregon Electric Line which has just been completed between Salem and Portland, now announce that the line connecting at South Portland will be at once constructed to Hillsboro and this city. This is certainly good news to this section in as much as it comes from a company who have shown by actual demonstrations that their announcements are not altogether hot air.

The opening of the Public Schools last week demonstrated again that this city is on the upward move. More students were there the first day than the previous year and the indications are that when all the children of school age are enrolled it will reach near the four hundred mark.
