Rev. J. A. Folsom, Superintendent of the Congregational Home Missionary society of this state, delivered an eloquent and instructive address at the Congregational church last Sunday morning upon the subject: "The Kingdom of God in Oregon." Missionary work, he said, is necessary for the success of any church—whether self-supporting or dependent. The church which is not missionary must be missioned unto. This one thing distinguishes the dead church from the live, growing, successful church.

There are many churches in the state that have no pastors which are pleading for help, and again there are many churches which have pastors that ought to be replaced by men, men who are real men. He delivered a hard blow to the cheap preacher who drits with the tide and said that in order to get men of ability it would require the price. He pleaded for preachers of more ginger. Portland has three churches without pastors, there are many churches in western, central and eastern Oregon without pastors and the Home Missionary Society must come to their aid. The church in Forest Grove and Oregon City were among the leaders in mission aid last year. Mr. Folsom paid a grand tribute to Oregon and its matchless resources, Oregon the empire of the west. The seating capacity of the church was taxed to the limit.

Edward Seymour of the Oregon Land Company, sold the place belonging to J. K. French one-half mile from Roy last week to C Griffin of Missouri, consideration \$3000. Mr. Griffin has been in the west for the past year looking around a considerable, and finally concluded that there is nothing like Washington county for real life and living.
