TRIANGULAR DEBATE.

Whitman, Willamette and Pacific Compose the League. "Immigration" is Theme.

Plans for the triangular debate between Whitman college, Willamette University and Pacific University are rapidly nearing their completion. At a meeting held at McMinnville Saturday representatives of Willamette and Pacific decided upon the general question for debate. The question has been submitted to Whitman for final wording. By this means much time will be saved in deciding upon a question for debate. The general question decided upon by Willamette and Pacific is "Immigration." What phase of this will be debated remains to be decided by Whitman.

It is thought by the Debate Council that the triangular debate will prove much more satisfactory than two single debates on different subjects. By this plan each institution will have two teams, one working on the negative and the other on the affirmative of the question. This will lessen the work for each team and make possible good practice debates and good training in rebuttal work. This plan also insures a fair statement of the question and an equal chance to each institution as far as the question is concerned.

The tryout at which the members of the two teams will be chosen will occur some time before the holidays.
