The interesting information reached the Christian Science Sentinel of Boston, through a letter from Dr. W. H. Tolman, Commission General of the United States at the Book and Paper Exposition. Dr. Tolman's letter was addressed to Rev. Wm. P. McKenzie of the Christian Science Publishing Society and is as follows—

PARIS, L'OCTOBRE 23, 1907.
