Levy a two year old heifer that dressed 500 pounds and according to people who should know this is going some.

Now is the time to remove all the leaves from your sidewalk so as to prevent an accident from falling. The recent rains together with the falling leaves have made the sidewalks very slippery and it is with no little difficulty that the pedestrian can stay on his feet in some sections of the city. The leaves should be removed immediately before some serious accident happens. It is a very easy matter for an old person to fall and when he does a serious injury frequently results.

The First National bank of this city, is relieving the money stringency in this section to a very large degree, for it is paying cash for all milk checks, and for the past few days they have paid out about \$10,000 to the farmers. This is appreciated by the milk men and others, as the checks are "payable only through the Seattle clearing house" and would otherwise make indefinite delay in getting money from that source.

Chamberlain made a grave mistake in declaring the holidays. The state of Washington has no holidays and Mr. Sparks says that conditions are very normal there. However if the depositors absolutely need the money it is paid out by the banking institutions.
