LAW SHUTS DOWN ON CREDIT SUBSCRIBERS.

It is announced that the postal department on Dec. 4 issued a ruling to the effect that on and after Jan. 1 all newspapers in order to be transmissible through the mails at present pound rates must be paid for in advance. Daily papers are allowed three months and weekly papers one year in which to collect their pay; that is, no paper can be sent on credit for a longer period than that named without becoming subject to a rate of postage which makes it practically impossible for the publisher to send it out.

This brings the matter to the status that subscriptions to The News must be paid in advance, and we would respectfully call your attention to the date on our paper. If you are in arrears please come in, or send in, as soon as you can and settle up. We trust our readers will not lay any blame to The News for this new order, for we are simply compelled to follow the laws laid down by the Post-office Department.

The most successful meeting of the Oregon editors ever held in this state, was that at Portland last Friday and Saturday. Editors from the four extreme

points of the compass were present. Matters of much importance to not only the editors themselves, but to the entire state as well were discussed and passed to record to be put in force. However, one of the most important features of the meeting was the establishing of a committee whose duty it is to formulate a uniform rate card for the Oregon newspapers to follow. There is no question but what the country newspaper man is the most underpaid human being of all professions, or possibly better—all businesses. There is no one to blame but himself in this matter, and one of the greatest reasons why he is underpaid, lies in the fact that he is trying to do too much for his community by way of publishing larger papers than his field will permit, and make a fair profit. Unlike the merchant, he has no "specials" to offer for the purpose of bringing the business to other parts of his store. He has but three channels in which to do business, which are the subscriptions, sale of advertising space and his job work. When he deviates from either of these he has nothing else to fall back on, or has no other way to make up the deficiency. Therefore it is absolutely necessary for him to follow a straight line in all these branches. If he don't he loses. Too many of us are today doing business in one or the other of the three channels, that is losing. The News has no fear that it will be criticised or will lose any business by the fact that it makes a legitimate profit on all of its business.

Practical Advice From a Dairyman.

There are a great many dairymen who do not know the possibilities of their own cows. They seek to improve their value as milk producers by buying new cows instead of improving the status of the old ones. True, new blood is to be desired, especially as it comes through the pure bred dairy sire. But much can be accomplished without waiting for a new herd to grow up.

Seldom will any man sell good cows. The buyer has to take culls or pay a price which places good cows beyond his reach. Much valuable time is lost in buying and selling. In the endeavor to get a few good ones, bred from the best cows only; test them to find out just what they are doing; raise the heifer calves from the best cows and, when old enough, breed them in turn to a sire strong in dairy blood. In this way, any man can have a herd in a few years that will be a credit and that will make for him a profit.

Observe every animal in the herd with a critical eye; brush the dirt and scurf out of the matted hair and see if it hasn't got an udder capable of being stretched by more milk. Offer extra feed, and if she eats it clean, volunteer more. Provide all on the pure water she will drink. Look to her bedding and comfort in the stable and see that she doesn't have to stand in a bleak barn yard or exposed to cold storms. Purchase a registered sire of some prominent breeder of whatever breed you have chosen; get one of good breeding and get one that transmits good points, and that is low in the legs, straight in the back and with a nice mellow skin. Take in mind that this will be the bull that you will keep for some time to come to improve your herd and to reproduce the qualities of his ancestors to a degree.

Do not be alarmed or disgusted if some of your neighbors tell you that you were foolish to pay such a large price for a bull just because he is a thoroughbred, and you will never get your money out of him. But beware of them; just let them gossip all they want. Let them use their scrub bulls and you use your pure bred and with constant mind and good care, you will see who will come out with the nicest herd of cows. You have got a herd of nice, young, high graded cows, salable
