

W. R. C. IN SUBSTANTIAL CONDITION

Report of the President Read Before Annual Meeting

ASSISTS MANY SOLDIERS

Pleas for Increased Support of Memorial Day—Financially Corps in Good Shape.

The following report of the condition of the local lodge of the W. R. C. was read by its President Mrs. Addie Morgan:

Commander of the Grand Army and Sisters of the Woman's Relief Corps:

Two years ago I accepted the office of President of J. B. Mathews Relief Corps No. 11, and looking back over the two years' work, the thought came to me that perhaps a brief account of what had been done here in our own corps and the Dept. of our own state would be of interest to us all. From the reports gathered from the twenty-third annual convention of the Woman's Relief Corps held at Newberg June 25, 26, 27, 1907, the condition is as follows:

The Department has now 38 corps in good standing with 1,358 members. Cash expended for relief for the year, \$759.90; other than money, \$1,749.30; number of soldiers assisted, 32; number in soldiers families assisted, 162; number of members assisted, 37; members families assisted, 77; total number assisted, 205. In the Dept. general fund we have \$333; Roseburg Cottage fund, \$30; Relief fund, \$52; supplies on hand \$66.28 value of Dept. property \$205.35. Total of \$657. So much for our Dept. Now we come to our own corps as to what J. B. Mathews corp No. 11 has done the past two years. While we have not increased in point of membership as we have wished for, your Auxiliary has not been idle. We have 38 members—have lost one by death, granted one discharge and granted two transfer cards. Cash expended for relief \$40.50, other than money \$38.50, total relief \$79. Number of visits made 95. The financial condition of the corps is excellent, and in comparison with the financial statement of the state at large your Auxiliary does not have to take a back seat.

In General Fund we have \$10.78, in Relief Fund 25 cents. In making this statement it proves to J. B. Mathews Post No. 6 that your Auxiliary is trying to do all that we obligated ourselves to do, that the pleasant relations and perfect harmony has prevailed between Post and Corps, and I in behalf of the members of your Auxiliary wish to extend our thanks to the retiring commander, Stephen Morgan, and every member of J. B. Mathews Post No. 6 our sincere thanks, for every act of kindness, help and courtesy shown us the past two years, and we also extend to the incoming officers and members of Post No. 6 the same loyalty, pledging ourselves to help and care for the soldiers and their loved ones for which we are banded together. And now my dear sisters as I am about to surrender, the trust that you honored me with, if I have merited the words, "well done, she has done the best she could," I am content, and I wish to thank, in this public way, my secretary, Mrs. Emily Anderson, who has been so faithful in the last two years, and to every officer and member for their loyal support and in closing I would urge each member present to realize that she has a personal responsibility in the affairs of this corps, and I bespeak for my successor the same loyal support that has been accorded to me.

New subscriptions are coming in, former contributors are either doubling or materially increasing their subscriptions, and every cent of it is devoted to advertising the State and not the city.

The Mid-Winter Livestock Show at Denver just closed was a tremendous success, and many of the exhibitors expressed a determination to be present at the Livestock Show in Portland this coming Fall. The Portland Country Club & Livestock Association have promised the Hunt Club that accommodations will be ready for them in June, and an army of men and horses are at work at the present time to make this pledge good.

Dairymen's Corner

A. W. Gillis, who owns the Jerome place between here and Cornelius and conducts a very systematic dairy farm has prepared some very interesting data for The News. He believes in doing things well and is making a grand success from his 14 acre farm and eight cows. He feeds his cows silage every month in the year and believes it the best and cheapest of cow feeds. His silo is 26 feet in height and 8½ feet in diameter. Mr. Gillis says that the reason that so many people make a failure with the silo is that they build their silos too large and expose the silage to the air which causes decomposition. It should be used from the top so as not to expose much of the surface to the air. The report is as follows:

No. 4 calved March 1, '06, and Nov. 15, '07, from Dec. 19, '06, to Dec. 19, '07, gave 5388 lbs. of milk 22629 lbs. butter fat, 264.01 lbs. butter. (This cow was only milked about one month as a fresh cow the balance of the year was the last end of a 20 month milking period.) Value of milk, condenser price.....\$82 36

No. 8 calved Sept. 2, '06 and Sept. 1, '07. From Dec. 19, '06, to Dec. 19, '07, gave 8416 lbs. milk, 361.16 lbs. butter fat or 421.35 churned butter. Value of milk, condenser price.....144 07

No. 9 calved Dec. 1, '06, from Dec. 1, '06, to Dec. 1, '07, gave 10263 lbs. milk, 413.89, butter fat, or 482.85 lbs. churned butter. Value of milk condenser price.....156 61

No. 10 calved June 12, '06 and Nov. 7, '07. From Dec. 19, '06 to Dec. 19, '07 gave 7462 lbs. milk, 303.35 lbs. butter fat or 353.91 lbs. churned butter. (This cow was also milked mostly as a stripper through the year.) Value of milk condenser, price.....113 51

No. 2 calved March 6, '07, and Jan. 8, '08. From March 9, '07 to Dec. 1, '07 gave 6744 lbs. milk, 294.72 lbs. butter fat, or 343.84 lbs. churned butter. Value of milk condenser price.....104 44

No. 7 calved June 5, '07. From June 5 to Jan. 1, '08,
