Hon. H. M. Cake of Portland, has announced himself as a candidate for the United States senate in opposition to Senator Fulton. Mr. Cake made the run two years ago but was defeated by Senator Bourne by a small majority. Mr. Cake is an able lawyer and is in every way qualified to fill the position. He has come out in support of Statement No. 1 and the direct primary law.

As promised, Francis J. Heney gave U. S. Senator C. W. Fulton a jolt in a speech made in Portland Tuesday night. All during the Hall trial, however, there has been but little to directly connect Fulton with the charge made by Heney, but it is conclusive that Fulton has aided in shielding criminals. The numerous letters exchanged between the Senator and those indicted might not disclose enough evidence to insure an indictment, but they have been printed and read by the people, which is enough.

How to Get Into the Scrap Next April and June.

As the primary election will be held April 17th, and the general election June 1st, it is of interest just now to know how to proceed in the matter of filing Initiative Petitions, Nominating Petitions, etc. According to the Secretary of State, compilation proceedings under initiative petitions must have 7,465 signatures; initiative petitions must be filed by Jan. 31; arguments advocating measures must be filed by Feb. 3d; person filing argument must pay cost of paper and printing; initiative measures must be printed by the Secretary of State by March 2d; Secretary must make up the form of ballot by March 4th.

Candidates for state and district offices and district attorneys must file with the Secretary of State at the time of beginning to circulate petitions a copy of the petition as evidence that said elector is a candidate for nomination by his party. The vote cast by a political party in each voting precinct for representative in Congress at the last preceding general election is the basis on which the percentage for petitions shall be counted and need not exceed 1000 signers.

Petitions for nomination for office to be voted for in the State at large must be signed by at least two per cent of the party electors.

Petitions for nominations for offices to be voted for in only one county or district, shall be filed with the County Clerk not less than fifteen days before the date of the primary election, Wednesday, April 1st. Primary elections will be held Friday, April 17th.

Register now, the books are open, and avoid the trouble of swearing in your vote. Having registered two years ago will not do, you have got to register every two years.

Councilman Walker of the Street Committee reported that he had made some inquiries in regard to cost of pipe for water extension towards the cemetery, but had not received quotations on 2-inch wood pipe. Further time granted.

Mayor Laughlin as special con-

mittee to investigate title of E. A. Hyde to strip of land corner Council Street and Pacific Avenue reported that nothing had been done since previous report. He turned in the abstract and opinion, showing title in city to disputed strip and papers were filed with recorder.

Bill of W. H. Hollis \$20.00 for abstract and legal services in case City vs. Bellinger was presented and on motion of Councilman Hollinger was allowed.

Application for water by J. N. Hoffman and for lights by G. O. Sloan were granted on usual restrictions.

The declination of Ed. R. Wirtz, elected to office of city marshal was read and on motion of Councilman Roe was accepted. Motion carried that Marshal Lennerville be invited to continue in office until further arrangements are made.
