**Funeral of I. L. Smith.**

The funeral of Hon. I. L. Smith, who died at Sheridan last week, occurred at this place Saturday morning under the auspices of the Masonic order. A large attendance of friends and Masons were present. Interment was at Buxton cemetery, and Rev. E. H. Bryant of Portland officiated.

For correction as to the deceased's biography which appeared in The News last week, we reprint a sketch of his most honorable life:

Irwin Lucas Smith was born in Franklin county Ohio, May 16, 1827, and when seven years of age moved to Illinois with his parents.

Upon the breaking out of the civil war he enlisted in 1862 in Company II., 64th Illinois Volunteer Infantry and participated in the battles of Yazoo City, Port Hutchinson and other minor engagements. His regiment was one of the two that crossed the Rio Grande river into Mexico, and was at the front in the capture of Fort Morgan. He was mustered out of the service and honorably discharged in 1865 with the rank of sergeant.

He was united in marriage to Miss Margaret Mathews in Illinois from which union twelve children were born, nine of whom survive him. In 1870 he removed with his family to Forest Grove, at which place Mrs. Smith died and was laid to rest in Hill cemetery. While at Forest Grove, he held many important positions of trust, and was for several terms a member of the state legislature.

Postmaster Atwell desires to call attention to the practice of some patrons of rural delivery of placing loose coins in their boxes each time they desire to dispatch letters instead of supplying themselves with postage in advance of their need. This practice imposes undue hardship on rural carriers in removing loose coins from boxes and delays them on the service of their routes. The postmaster, therefore, urgently requests that patrons of rural delivery provide themselves and keep on hand a supply of stamps consistent with and in advance of their needs. It is also very desirable that rural patrons place in their boxes small detachable cups of wood or tin in which to place coins, when necessary, in purchasing supplies of stamps.
