H. M. CAKE SPEAKS HERE.
(Continued From Page One.)
The speaker further declared that United States Senators have not been a success for the reason that they have been elected by interests that control the legislatures and were not free to serve the people but must abide by the wants of the interests that were responsible for their election. He hoped, he said, that if he went to congress that he would be sent by the direct vote of the people and that he would work and vote for the interests of the people. He declared allegiance to the republican party and against the machine politician whose days he declared were numbered. He said that he could see no reason why the people should not elect the senators the same as they elect the congressmen, governors or any other officers. He referred to the election of the presidents and declared that it was the same as advocated by the statement; that the electors simply abided by the will of the people and could see no reason why the legislators should not do likewise.
Mr. Cake gave the machine politician a pretty hard jolt on the line of the possibility of a democrat being elected to the Senate this year or any other year in as much as the republican majority in this state is between 25,000 and 40,000. He declared that the republicans should spend their time in party fealty and if they did there would be no need to hide behind the fence.
After the meeting was over Mr. Cake met many of the citizens of this place and impressed them as being a man who if sent to the senate would be a friend of theirs. He left on the morning train for Newberg where he spoke the following night. It is his intention to travel all over the state in the interest of his candidacy.
