There is a bill before the senate that if passed by both houses, will give Forest Grove another bank. In other words it will be a Postal Savings bank, with headquarters at the post-office and the postmaster as cashier.

Governor Chamberlain says: "There are no great National issues to be discussed in this campaign." He knows better than that, but he would draw all attention to Statement No. 1 by which he proposes to hoodwink the republican voters into putting him in the Senate.

And after all, the sailing to Pacific waters of the great American fleet, means that only a short visit will be paid us by Uncle Sam's boats. After staying on this coast just long enough to be courteous, the fleet will move on to other waters and eventually land in the New York harbor, after sailing around the world.

Governor Chamberlain says he is in accord with the policies of Roosevelt, and wants to know if as much can be said of all those in his (Roosevelt's) own party. If the governor thinks so much of the president and republican party, why doesn't he come out for senator on the republican ticket, instead of sticking to the party that is 40,000 in the minority? Scat!

W. S. U'Ren, who accused Judge Cake, candidate for the senate, of being lukewarm for Statement No. 1, and who because of this fact, came out for the senate himself, has changed his mind. Mr. U'Ren thinks now that Cake has dropped the luke and has warmed up sufficiently for the statement as to

relieve him of the job of running for the senate and maintaining the measure. Anyway that's his excuse, and a poor excuse is better than none.

Governor Chamberlain has announced his candidacy for the U. S. Senate on the Democratic ticket. It has been a well known fact that he would be a candidate ever since he was elected governor two years ago, provided Statement No. 1 was well enough supported to afford him a ghost of a show. It is very apparent then, we must assume, that Mr. Chamberlain sees his golden opportunity to again be elected to a high office by the assistance of the Republicans, enough of whom have twice bolted their ticket and given him the highest office in the state. Mr. Chamberlain, during his term in that office, has made a good governor—which any constituency has a right to expect—but it is not reasonable to believe that a Democratic Senator, who would undoubtedly be in the minority party, could make good at Washington. We do not believe that the big Republican majority of this county is going to turn itself inside out for the benefit of this political Moses, who declares that "there are no national issues in this campaign." By this, we suppose, that the policies of President Roosevelt amount to nothing; that the tariff does not need a revision; that railroad regulation is unnecessary; that trusts should go on and multiply; that we need no deep rivers and no clear harbors; that the constitution does not need amending to give the people the legal right to choose their senators—so long as Statement No. 1 will give that alleged privilege. No, for the governor, there are no "great National issues"—nothing but Statement No. 1!

For State Senator.

Another candidate enters the political arena, and this time in the person of Earl E. Fisher of Beaverton, for state senator on the republican ticket. Mr. Fisher is a young man of about 25 years of age, and has been elected mayor of Beaverton three times against strong opposition. He is a school teacher and is well known in the eastern part of the county where he is very popular.

In his announcement which follows he put a new phase of the popular or peoples' choice for U. S. senators by

declaring to support the republican nominee who receives the highest vote in the primaries:

"I hereby announce myself a candidate for State Senator, on the Republican ticket, for the Eleventh Senatorial District of Oregon, comprising Washington County.

If elected I will introduce and work for the following bills at the next session of the Legislature.

A two cent fare per mile on all railroads in Oregon.

Select school text books every ten years instead of six as at present, and then only make such changes that are necessary.

Repeal the Hunting License Law. Begin rocking all the roads in Washington county, by spending in each road district every cent of road tax levied in said district, for road purposes on rock.

I am in favor of doing away with "hold up" Legislatures by electing U. S. Senators by direct vote of the people, and I will vote for the Republican nominee who receives the highest vote in the Primary Election.
