DRAMATIC ENTERTAINMENT.

Public Speaking department presents "Mr. Bob." Large appreciative audience attend.

The audience that gathered Friday night to hear the recital given by the Public Speaking department, was the largest there has been this year.

The first part of the program consisted of four readings. It was opened by a monologue, Browning's "Evelyn Hope" given by Miss Hawley. It showed thorough preparation and was well appreciated by the audience. Miss Silverman followed with "The Thunder Oak," taken from Henry Van Dyke's "First Christmas Tree." It is a very dramatic selection and Miss Silverman brought out strongly the weird and terrible spirit of the reading.

Miss Payne's rendering of the monologue "Unexpected Guests" was very natural and she kept her audience in a roar of laughter.

Miss Heidel closed this part of the program with "Guinevere" from Tennyson's "Idyls of the King." Miss Heidel's work was well finished and showed a marked appreciation of the deep feeling expressed by the beautiful passage.

This was followed by the comedy "Mr. Bob." The play is in itself very amusing and was so well presented that it held the attention from first to last.

The work done by Mr. Gwynn, as Philip, was especially good and deserved great praise.

Miss Chandler, as "Aunt Becky" was also very pleasing and brought forth much favorable comment.

Miss Hollinger, who took the role of "Patty" the maid, made one of the most telling hits of the evening.

Miss Payne, Miss Hawley, Mr. Ward and Mr. Ferrin were also very good in their roles.

The whole was so well balanced that it was hard to say which part gave the most pleasure to the audience. The work as presented by each individual speaks highly of the public speaking department. Every character was real. There were no dull moments connected with the Comedy. Much time and labor were expended to give the public something worth listening to.

Last year "the Bridge of the Gods," given mostly by members of the drama class, received the same efficient training of Prof. Orr. Prof. Orr is a dramatic artist of exceptional ability. He has had training at Dr. Curry's School of Expression in Boston, and has proved his efficiency along dramatic lines since his coming to Pacific.

Plans Inaugurated to Clear Student Body of Large Debt Incurred by Debate Council.

President J. R. Ward called a meeting of the Student Body, last Tuesday afternoon, to consider ways and means for raising money to meet the indebtedness of that organization, which was incurred by the Debate Council.

Pacific University has always maintained a good standing in Debate and Oratory, which necessarily involves a great expense. Our expenses this year were rather heavy as the prizes given in the Local Oratorical Contest fell upon the Student Body and the receipts for admissions failed to cover his amount. The debate with Whitman likewise failed to meet the expenses of the visiting team and our Academy debating team which will meet the Pendleton Academy on April 17, will also need the outlay of a little ready capital.

In order to meet the above expenses several plans were proposed and it was agreed to circulate a subscription list among the members of the faculty and get their cooperation for eliminating the debt. A tax was also levied on each member of the Student Body and by the enthusiasm shown in last Tuesday's meeting the organization will soon be entirely free from any incumbrance. The faculty has always given generously in the past to student enterprises and have come forward this time with liberal contributions in support of this cause, and it is hoped that every student will step forward and do his or her part.
