### City Council.

Aside from the filing of several reports, a discussion of the cement walk ordinance and the enjoyment of a hearty good laugh over the threatening inroads of the "bubonic plague to the denizens" of a certain ward, the city council did not accomplish a great deal at its session Tuesday evening. Nevertheless it was a one-thousand dollar session. The treasury will be depleted of that amount for payment of the month's various claims and of the interest on a number of warrants held by T. J. Todd.

The claim from Frank Bernard for damages alleged to have been sustained on account of condition of A street near track of electric line was referred to the street committee for investigation.

The street commissioner was instructed to collect for the actual cost and installation expenses of the water meters which have been installed by the city at the request of water users.

The matter of the selection and probable purchase of a dumping ground was discussed at some length. The city needs property to receive garbage and rubbish and the council finds it a difficult task to find a suitable location.

The payment of the interest on ten warrants held by Thos. J. Todd was ordered paid. The interest for five years at 4 per cent amounts to \$531.42.

The committee on finance made a report on the collections from light and water for year ending April 1, 1908. "We find," says the report, "that the total for year's collection is \$6815.47 and as per contract and agreement there is due E. W. Haines for 1/4 of the increase for years the sum of \$8.48."

April 13, 1908

To the Hon. Mayor and Common Council of Forest Grove City.

Gentlemen:

Your attention is respectfully directed to the morass which has existed for several months, along the roadside in front of my house at corner of B street and North Third Ave.

It is caused by the backwater from the overflow of some sort of a paper hydrant placed at said corner.
