It's a good clean ticket from top to bottom.

Who was it that won the Statement No. 1 victory; Chamberlain or Cake?

Haven't the democrats made a mistake and voted for the strongest instead of the weakest candidate?

It has been said that there is no republican party in Oregon. They simply meant "machine" instead of "party."

Hon. H. M. Cake is deserving of the nomination he won. He made a good clean campaign and worked hard for the place he sought. That he will win at the June election there is no doubt.

The democrats of this county now come to the front to nominate a legislative ticket that will "support the primary law," not that they care to use it themselves, for mass conventions suit their purposes better.

The Oregonian has shown that it is the duty of Gov. Chamberlain to withdraw from the senatorial fight. Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Cake stand on the same platform as regards Statement No. 1, but Mr. Cake went forth and fought for its establishment and irrevocably won its battle while Mr. Chamberlain did nothing for the popular choice measure. To send a democrat back to Washington this year is to repudiate the administration. Oregon won't do it!

Almost before all the ballots of last Friday's primaries were counted, the democrats—or a few of them—had out advertising for a mass convention to be held in Hillsboro tomorrow for the purpose of nominating a leg-

islative ticket that will "support the primary law and Statement No. 1." The democrats have been reluctant about using the primary law in this county, in fact, not a name appeared on their ballot, and the calling of a mass convention at this time for that purpose is not a consistent motive, but rather a rebuke. As for Statement No. 1, the victory is already won.
