### Dies in Alaska.

News reached here Tuesday morning of the death of T. J. Harris well-known in this city, who died at Walden, Alaska, last Sunday at the age of 56 years. He was a native Oregonian having been born at Lafayette, Ore., August 12, 1852 where with the exception of five years' residence in Forest Grove immediately following ten years' residence in Alaska, he had lived all his life. In 1882 he was chosen deputy sheriff for Yamhill county and served in that capacity until 1886 when he was elected sheriff and served for two terms. Mr. Harris, though a Democrat in politics, carried the county, which was Republican, by 400. He was a member of Holbrook lodge A. F. & A. M. of this city. In 1875 he was married at Lafayette, to Miss Lizzie B. Large, who with two sons, Clyde and Fred both of Portland, survive him.
