### A HERO OF THE BUSH.

The Daring and Devotion of a Brave Maori Youth.  
Courage is not an attribute peculiar to the white man, nor is self sacrifice the prerogative of civilization. In Mr. J. C. Pirth's "Nation Making" is told a story as touching in its brave devotion as any tale of the Victoria cross. The incident occurred at Orakan, where the English soldiers had just defeated the Maoris. A little party of colonial troops, pursuing fugitives, came upon three natives, two old men and one young fellow.

The youth, seeing the soldiers, dropped on one knee and aimed with his gun at the advancing party, which halted a moment, while the old men ran toward the forest. The old men had thrown away their firearms in order to make escape easier. The soldiers fired at the youth, but missed. Without discharging his gun he sprang to his feet and ran on in advance until he caught up with the old men once more. Then, facing about, he presented his gun as before, but reserved his fire.

The weary old men gradually drew near cover. Once more the soldiers fired and missed; once more the gallant fello turned and bounded on. The old men were close to the forest when the youth, nearly fainting, again knelt and took aim, but still did not fire.

The soldiers shot him as he knelt and rushed to the forest, but failed to capture the two fugitives, who, safe in the dense underbrush, made their escape.

On their return the soldiers found the brave young fellow lying dead. His gun was empty; it had not been loaded at all. With it he had covered the retreat of the old men and secured their freedom by the loss of his own life. No more gallant deed of heroic devotion was ever accomplished in any land.

### PROF. COOK ADDRESSES STUDENTS

Men of Science His Theme. A Brief History Is Given of the Thompsons. Their Contribution to Science.

As a part of last Wednesday's special chapel exercises, Prof. Cook gave an interesting paper entitled "The Work of the Thompsons in the Field of Science." Prof. Cook began by saying that there were so many prominent names in the field of science that it is difficult to select any two or three more important than others, but for the purposes of his paper he chose the three Thompsons. He then gave a brief sketch of each and the work they had done. The first he mentioned was Benjamin Thompson, an American. He was born in Ohio. He was educated at Howard College, and after leaving college he taught school. He took up the work of science and was highly honored by the English government. He was also made Count of the Holy Roman Empire. His particular contribution to science was the destruction of the material theory of heat, and theory to the world the molecular theory which is still held by scientists.

William Thompson, better known as Lord Kelvin, was born in Glasgow. He matriculated at the University of Glasgow when eleven years of age. He also attended Cambridge for four years. He won the lasting esteem of Americans by his hearty cooperation in the project of the Atlantic cable, which was then the foremost topic of the day. His special scientific work was along the lines of light, heat and electricity.

Joseph Thompson, an Englishman, was the third of this group of eminent scientists. He was educated in the best colleges. He was Doctor of Science in Oxford, and served also at Dublin, and Columbia. In 1906 he was awarded the Nobel prize for his work in physics. He gave valuable knowledge of radium and electricity. Prof. Cook's paper was somewhat brief, but well written and interesting.

### A Letter From Mrs. Hill, Former Instructor at P. U.

The editor of The Index received the following communication from Mrs. Grace Wood Hill of Sao Paulo, Brazil. Mrs. Hill for the three years 1904-05-06 was instructor in the Academy. SAO PAULO, BRAZIL, Mch. 17, '08

Dear Friends at Pacific.—I have heard very little this year from P. U. and I have often wondered what might be happening. I think when I left I promised an occasional letter to The Index—and may this be at least a partial fulfillment. Mr. Hill will bear witness that my affection for the west and for Pacific in particular does not wane, and even now we are planning, when our vacation comes, to visit the Pacific coast.

This beautiful March day we are beginning to feel a touch of coming winter, and I for one rejoice. The summer is not hot indoors, but the lack of change saps our strength. The cooler weather braces us up greatly.

Mr. Hill is very busy just now getting the Association work started for the year. The English classes are one of the greatest inducements to enter the Association. A class for chaffeurs is a new feature.

Sao Paulo is a beautiful city of 300,000 people, with more Italians than Brazilians. The large concerns of the city, such as gas, electricity, etc., are mostly in the hands of English, American and German capitalists. This is the center of the coffee trade, and much of the rich products of this resourceful country passes through the Sao Paulo markets.

Brazilian life is distinctly Latin, an adaptation from French, Spanish, Italian and Portuguese. This extends to fashions which are always Parisian, to architecture, gardening and the general plans and mode of life. We have early coffee with rolls, breakfast at eleven, lunch at three and dine at six or later.

There are many Catholic colleges and schools here; also state schools, Normal and Polytechnic, a Baptist school and Mackenzie college, a very good college under Presbyterian control. Sao Paulo is therefore one of the most important student centers of Brazil. Mr. Hurrey, who was secretary for the college associations of the middle west, is coming to Brazil in July to develop the student work of South America, a work which appealed very strongly to Mr. Mott when he visited us two years ago.

I know you would all like to see Miss Dorothy Wright Hill. She is a bonny lass, blessed with perfect health and a charming smile. She celebrates six months of her sojourn with us by cutting her first tooth today. She often gives the "yell," but it is hard to tell whether it is for Drury, Northwest or Pacific.

I suppose by the time this reaches you the picnic epidemic will have begun. I am sorry I can't be there to help chaperone—I am properly qualified now—and have lost none of my liking for out of door expeditions. Dorothy Wright and I conduct frequent excursions on our Avenida.

Mr. Hill joins me in good wishes for P. U. and to former friends.

H. P. Humphreys, our all around man, did honors for himself and won laurels for his college in taking 19 points from the visitors. The pole vault was the most excit-
